COUNCIL CHAMBER WORK SESSION

- **Discussion on the Quarterly Investment Report for the Quarter ending December 31, 2019.**

Assistant Finance Director Paula McPartlin stated that normally the Councilmember that serves on the Investment Committee would report to the Council on the Quarterly Investment Report; however, with the increase in the size of the portfolio, it was advisable for Council to hear the report firsthand. Tom Ross with Valley View Consulting, the City's investment advisors, presented an overview of the report. He stated the portfolio increased from \$131,870,000 to \$150,971,000, for a net increase of approximately \$19,100,000. The yield on the operating funds was 1.99 percent and on the Texas Water Development Board portion was 1.64 percent, for an overall yield of 1.91 percent. He presented an overview of the City's investment holdings, the composition of the portfolio, a comparison to the previous quarter, and the allocation of the investments across various City funds. In response to a question from Council regarding investing in something more aggressive, Mr. Ross stated state law prevents it. He felt the City had an appropriate investment policy that protects the City's funds and gives it the ability to invest. There was discussion on the impact of the Coronavirus on the City's investments.

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- **Update on the Business Town Hall Meeting held February 24, 2020.**

Community Affairs Commission Chairperson Sal Caruso presented an overview of the Business Town Hall Meeting. He stated five business owners attended the meeting, including representatives from PostalAnnex, What's Poppin' Texas, Wood & Grain Bistro, Colossal Sandwich Shop and Turning Point Brewery. He presented comments from those businesses, including praise for the permit employees and the Development Department, issues with landlords, and ideas, including welcome packets for new businesses about available City services; making it less expensive to participate in City events, including BluesFest; early registration for businesses at events; assistance with marketing; events focused on Bedford restaurants, similar to the Chamber of Commerce expo; reward and frequent shopper programs; and better communication on existing City resources. Mr. Caruso discussed reactions from the businesses and Commission members to the Town Hall. There was discussion regarding supporting and engaging with businesses; reward and couponing programs for businesses; reinstating a physical Bedford Connection; giving favorable status to Bedford businesses to participate in City events; promotional ideas; informational packages for new businesses; following up on the ideas and comments from the meeting; and the businesses invited to the meeting.

- **Presentation of Neighborhood Services Division: practices, strategies, and goals.**

Development Director Bill Syblon stated Council approved the new Neighborhood Services Division (NSD) under the Economic Development Department as part of the previous year's budget process. The creation of the NSD involved transitioning Code Compliance from the Police Department to Development and moving the entire department to the former library building to offer better customer service and increase collaboration amongst the various divisions.

Neighborhood Services Manager Andrew Kloefkorn presented an overview of the historical view of code compliance, the mission and values statements of the NSD, the new approach to code compliance under the NSD, the values of the NSD, and working a code compliance case. He discussed the community engagement component of the NSD and its impact to residents. Mr. Kloefkorn gave an overview of the data driven approach taken by the NSD and presented data on cases, violations and compliance by district as well as violations per 1,000 residents compared to benchmark cities. He discussed future goals for the NSD, including a Bedford Urban Revitalization Program, a Bedford Helping Bedford Program, a Community Service Program, block parties and a Bedford Neighborhood Coalition.

There was discussion on data collection; the status of the proposed NSD programs; an ordinance to give the municipal court judge the authority to help expedite the abatement of violations; NSD staffing and the impact of the move under Development; community engagement; identifying and adapting programs to work in Bedford; the impact of code violations to neighboring properties; the number of resident-initiated cases versus staff-initiated cases and the NSD being more proactive; the cycle for NSD officers to cover their entire district; educating residents on code violations; follow-up and monitoring of cases, including those that have come into compliance; hoarding cases, including the mental-health aspect of such cases; the process for issuing citations; issues with the Better It app; residents serving as points-of-contact for their neighborhoods; staff working with residents to mitigate violations; placing liens on properties; updating ordinances and policies; progress made on the issues with donation bins; benchmarks and timeframes for success; updating software; staff utilizing the Nextdoor app; working with 6Stones on various programs; educating new businesses on codes, including the Sign Ordinance;

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the effect of code violations on businesses; the importance of personal property rights; scheduling NSD officers on weekends and off-hours; incentivizing residents to tear down old houses and build new ones in their place; regular updates to Council on the NSD; bringing ordinance updates and programs to Council; measuring non-compliance; the average day of a NSD officer; challenges and goals for the NSD; and staffing.

- **Council discussion regarding the City's plans, including, but not limited to, the Comprehensive Land Use Plan.**

He reported the Library would be closed from March 30 to April 3, 2020 for a makeover.

3. **Public hearing and consider an ordinance to rezone Lots 2 and 3, Block 2, Grubbs Enterprises Addition from Heavy Commercial (H) to Heavy Commercial/Specific Use Permit/New and Used Cars and Truck Sales and Service (H/SUP), specific to Section 3.2.C(8)d of the City of Bedford Zoning Ordinance, allowing for the operation of motor vehicle sales and rental service. The property is located in the Master Highway Corridor (MHC) Overlay District specific to Section 4.18 of the City of Bedford Zoning Ordinance. The property is generally located south of Airport Freeway and west of Brown Trail. (PZ-SUP-2020-50007)**

Jayashree Narayana with Livable Plans and Codes, the City's interim planner, stated the application is for a specific use permit (SUP) to operate a used car dealership. Grubbs is vacating one building on their property and getting a new tenant named Uptown New and Used Car. The Planning and Zoning Commission recommended approval of this application at their last meeting. She stated there was a SUP approved for Grubbs in 2005, and everything is being kept the same on the property, including parking and landscaping. In response to questions from Council, Ms. Narayana confirmed there were no concerns from the Commission meeting and stated she believed there were variances given with the SUP in 2005, which run with the property.

Mayor Boyter opened the public hearing at 7:52 p.m.

Motioned by Councilmember Culver, seconded by Councilmember Burnett, to approve an ordinance to rezone Lots 2 and 3, Block 2, Grubbs Enterprises Addition from Heavy Commercial (H) to Heavy Commercial/Specific Use Permit/New and Used Cars and Truck Sales and Service (H/SUP), specific to Section 3.2.C(8)d of the City of Bedford Zoning Ordinance, allowing for the operation of motor vehicle sales and rental service. The property is located in the Master Highway Corridor (MHC) Overlay District specific to Section 4.18 of the City of Bedford Zoning Ordinance. The property is generally located south of Airport Freeway and west of Brown Trail. (PZ-SUP-2020-50007)

Motion approved 6-1-0. Mayor Boyter declared the motion carried.

- 4. Public hearing and consider an ordinance to rezone Lot 1, Block 1, Christian Life Tabernacle Addition and James M. Matson Survey, Abstract 1090, Tract 6A, located at 1104 Central Drive, Bedford, Texas, from (R15) Residential 15,000 SF Detached to (R15/SUP) Residential 15,000 SF Detached/Specific Use Permit, specific to Section 3.2.C.2.a, Churches, Temples and Synagogues, of the City of Bedford Zoning Ordinance, allowing for Christian Life Tabernacle Church to operate a church. The subject property is generally located east of Central Drive and north of Gettysburg Place. (PZ-SUP- 2018-50060)**

Ms. Narayana stated the applicant is an existing church on Central Drive. The site is zoned R-15,000 and the existing church is approximately 5,400 square feet. The church is expanding and building a new 11,300 square foot structure, along with additional parking. She stated an un-platted piece of property is being incorporated into the site, which will have to be re-platted prior to occupation of the building. The Planning and Zoning Commission recommended approval of this item at their meeting on February 13, 2020. She stated it was the second time the case was heard by the Commission, as the first time there were concerns about drainage issues on the property, which were resolved by the applicant to the satisfaction of the Commission. In response to questions from Council, Ms. Narayana stated the applicant is required to do screening and there is an existing fence along the property. Regarding concerns expressed at the first Commission meeting, she stated the applicant added a detention pond on the southwest corner of the site and more evergreen trees along the perimeter. Further, a lighting plan was included that dictates the lights would be turned off at a certain time and would be directed more towards Central Drive. In response to further questions from Council, she stated the City's engineer reviewed the concept plan for the drainage, which would be finalized during the platting process.

The subject property is generally located east of Central Drive and north of Gettysburg Place. (PZ-SUP- 2018-50060)

Motion approved 7-0-0. Mayor Boyter declared the motion carried.

She stated Council discussed the amount of money, including the \$10.00 and the \$6,000 for the construction changes needed to the upstairs of the Old Bedford School. She stated it was nothing new to Council and she would be voting yes. She stated she was not fully in agreement that it is the best of financial arrangements, but it has been proposed and presented.

CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Boyter called the Special Session to order at 1:00 p.m.

OPEN FORUM

City Secretary Michael Wells read the emails from the following individuals:

Cyndy Lay – Ms. Lay asked why code violations were considered an essential service. She stated she received a second warning regarding her lawn following an extended period of rain. She was confused why the City would issue warnings on lawns when everybody is pulling together and wondered why the City thought it was an appropriate use of resources. She asked if it occurred to the City that some people may be required to self-isolate due to COVID-19.

Ana Chinchilla – Ms. Chinchilla stated that both the Coronavirus and rats attack the respiratory system, and that her neighborhood, along with 12 other cases, are suffering with the problem. She begged the City to follow-up on her case as well as the 12 others. She stated she pays taxes so that City employees have a salary and do their job and asked why they are not doing it accordingly.

Dave Kirkham – Mr. Kirkham stated he is a local business owner and asked for clarification on the definition of a necessary business, would there be any additional support measures to

businesses from the City and if so, what they would be, and if the City is open for additional means of marketing and advertising, including rental boards, window lights, flags and pennants.

Jessica Quick – Ms. Quick, representing Eules Vapor, stated they are determined to help stop the spread of the COVID-19 virus and provide essential services to the citizens. They feel they fall under a unique circumstance as it relates to essential businesses. She discussed the measures they have taken regarding the virus, the effect on their customers who would be at risk with health conditions caused by combustible cigarettes, and their ability to make and bottle hand sanitizer. She asked that the City consider them an essential business.

1. Consider a resolution approving an executive order of Mayor Michael Boyter in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Mayor Boyter discussed the communication between Tarrant County and the mayors of the municipalities, which helps bring uniformity in the messages going out and the direction needed to go forward. He presented an overview of the various declarations and orders made by the county, state and Bedford. He stated this item is an executive order mirroring the one made by Tarrant County Judge Glenn Whitley on March 24, 2020 and presented an overview of the main tenants and definitions contained within the order.

There was discussion regarding area hospitals asking for “stay-at-home” measures; the benefits of the City issuing its own disaster declarations and orders; budgetary implications; clarifying what are essential businesses, including the vapor store mentioned during Open Forum; the City’s plans to communicate this order to residents and the business community; the tenant of the order allowing the City to commandeer any private property, including removing the section entirely, adding an explanation of how and when such action would take place, adding language that any action would be subject to Council discussing it in advance, and adding back the provision at a later time; employees in essential businesses having documentation to prove where they work; voluntary compliance from the business community; enforcement of violations of the order; posting the order on the front page of the City’s webpage; educating the public about the order; and uniformity amongst the various entities maintaining consistency with the County’s language.

Councilmember Sabol stated that striking the language in Item #4 goes against trying to do everything uniformly, and prefers consistency with messaging and the order, and to stay with what the County has written.

Motioned by Councilmember Cogan, seconded by Councilmember Fisher, to approve a resolution approving an executive order of Mayor Michael Boyter in response to the COVID-19 pandemic with the exception that Item #4 be struck.

Motion approved 5-2-0. Mayor Boyter declared the motion carried.

Voting in favor of the motion: Mayor Boyter, Councilmember Sartor, Councilmember Cogan, Councilmember Burnett and Councilmember Fisher

Voting in opposition to the motion: Councilmember Sabol and Councilmember Culver

There was discussion on including the expiration date of the order.

Motioned by Councilmember Cogan, seconded by Councilmember Burnett, to approve a resolution approving an executive order of Mayor Michael Boyter in response to the COVID-19 pandemic with the exception that Item #4 be struck and it taking effect until April 7, 2020.

Motion approved 6-1-0. Mayor Boyter declared the motion carried.

Voting in favor of the motion: Mayor Boyter, Councilmember Sartor, Councilmember Cogan, Councilmember Burnett, Councilmember Culver and Councilmember Fisher

Voting in opposition to the motion: Councilmember Sabol

2. Consider a resolution of the City of Bedford, Texas postponing the special election scheduled to be held on Saturday, May 2, 2020 to allow the voters to consider voting for or against the following proposition: the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages including mixed beverages, to Tuesday, November 3, 2020 or an earlier date as authorized by the Governor of the State of Texas; and providing an effective date.

City Secretary Michael Wells presented information regarding this item. He stated in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, Governor Greg Abbott issued a proclamation on March 18, 2020 to suspend sections of the Texas Election Code allowing political subdivisions to move their elections to the November 3, 2020 uniform election date, which requires action by the governing body. The language in the resolution is such that the special election would be postponed until November, unless an earlier date is authorized by the Governor. He stated there has been a push amongst municipalities that these local elections be held in conjunction with the primary runoffs, which were postponed to July. In response to questions from Council, Mr. Wells stated if postponed, the next actions would be to order the election for November or the earlier date if authorized by the Governor. Mayor Boyter stated there have been discussions amongst neighboring cities about issuing a proclamation to the Governor to move the elections to July.

Motioned by Councilmember Fisher, seconded by Councilmember Sartor, to approve of a resolution of the City of Bedford, Texas postponing the special election scheduled to be held on Saturday, May 2, 2020 to allow the voters to consider voting for or against the following proposition: the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages including mixed beverages, to Tuesday, November 3, 2020 or an earlier date as authorized by the Governor of the State of Texas; and providing an effective date.

Motion approved 7-0-0. Mayor Boyter declared the motion carried.

3. Discussion regarding conducting future City Council meetings.

Mayor Boyter presented information on this item. Mayor Boyter stated that it is necessary to do business differently moving forward to honor the social distancing rules. There was discussion regarding video or telephone conferencing, utilizing Teams or ZOOM; staff presentations; managing the conversation through teleconferencing; keeping the meetings to just business; holding face-to-face meetings. Council was of the consensus to hold face-to-face meetings with the ability to conference in if necessary.

4. Staff report on COVID-19 mitigation efforts.

Interim City Manager Cliff Blackwell presented the City's action plan to go into effect the following day. He presented an overview of what was determined to be essential versus non-essential

functions and services. He stated that a frequently asked questions document is being developed to be shared amongst staff so they would be prepared to answer questions from the public. He presented an overview of time-sensitive agenda items that needed to be brought to Council in April. He stated certain staff members would be asked to remain at home if they fall within the non-essential function role, while the department heads are being allowed to establish a flexible schedule for their employees who fall within the essential function role, including having the ability to work remotely from home. All staff would be treated from the following day to April 7, 2020 as if they were physically working at the City. Mr. Blackwell recommended that all remaining City facilities be closed public access, except for the detention center lobby at the Law Enforcement Center. He further recommended the closure of the parks so as not to encourage social gatherings. He stated citizens would be directed to online services, such as paying for court tickets and water bills. Mr. Blackwell presented an overview of the City's efforts in keeping residents and the business community informed. He asked Council their expectations with respect to City services.

There was discussion on posting the frequently asked questions document to the website; moving the Phase Next budget pro forma agenda item from April to later in the year; how citizens are to file police reports; options for paying court tickets and water bills over the phone; the status of Phase Next, including design documents, and the Arts and Entertainment facility; enforcing high grass and weed regulations; not amending the Sign Ordinance; closing the parks, keeping the bathroom and trash facilities open and maintained, and putting up signage that the playground equipment is not sanitized; and voluntary compliance from residents. In response to questions from Council, Mr. Blackwell stated water disconnections for non-payment have been postponed for at least 30 days.

Mayor Boyter read a speech discussing the effects of COVID-19 virus and the measures having to be taken by the Tarrant County and the City of Bedford to get out ahead of the potential impact to the community. He stated the City issued an executive order asking all residents in non-essential businesses to stay home. He stated it was not to impugn civil liberties but to protect the health and welfare of the entire community. He provided an overview of the essential services the City would still provide and discussed the City's evolving priorities. He implored citizens to use common sense, to take steps to limit their exposure and not to panic and hoard supplies. He stated he has been encouraged by the actions of the community and thanked Council and staff for their response to the situation; Tarrant County Judge Whitley, Tarrant County Public Health and the other area mayors for their leadership; and Steve Chapman with the Hurst-Euless-Bedford Independent School District, Fraser Hay with HEB Mid-Cities, and all local health care professionals.

Mayor Boyter stated a declaration of local disaster due to public health emergency was issued on March 19, 2020 and the City Council met and adopted an executive order on March 25, 2020, which was essentially a "state-at-home" order. He discussed recent amendments made to Tarrant County Judge Glen Whitley's executive order, as well as an executive order issued by Governor Greg Abbott and an opinion by Attorney General Ken Paxton. He stated the City's executive order expires that day, and Council needs to discuss extending the order and incorporating the language from Tarrant County and the state. Amendments include definitions of essential services; that nothing in the order is intended to restrict essential services permitted by the Governor's order; not restricting business operations in compliance with the Attorney General's opinion; changes regarding minimum business operations and elective medical procedures;

removal of language regarding price gouging; changing the restrictions on worship services; adding curbside pickup as options for restaurants; adding yard maintenance and landscapers as essential businesses; and changing the language for essential critical infrastructure. He discussed extensions of orders in Tarrant County and other counties.

There was discussion on the reasoning behind removal of the price gouging language and Tarrant County removing language regarding the seizure of property. There was discussion regarding the language related to religious services, including Governor Abbott's order adding them to the list of essential services; the incorporation of language in Governor Abbott's order into Judge Whitley's order; and the language in the attached chart to Judge Whitley's order prohibiting all in-person worship services.

Motioned by Councilmember Fisher, seconded by Councilmember Sartor, to approve extending Mayor Boyter's order to April 30, 2020 based on the text of the order and not the chart.

There was discussion on the end date for the order, including leaving it open-ended; the language regarding religious services, including language in Mayor Boyter's previous order; leaving in language for price gouging; and other amendments to the order.

Councilmember Fisher stated the preservation of as many rights as possible even in a pandemic is paramount and did not want his name on an order that says that people will not have church.

Mr. Blackwell stated the previous contract with SGR was \$145 an hour and the buyout to SGR for the City hiring Ms. Snook would be \$10,000.

ITEM:

Consider a resolution authorizing the Interim City Manager to purchase expendable medical supplies from Bound Tree Medical LLC, through an interlocal agreement with the City of Cedar Hill, in an amount not to exceed \$70,000.

City Attorney Review: N/A

SUMMARY:

This item is to request authorization to purchase routine, emergency medical service supplies for ambulance stock, through an interlocal agreement, in an amount not to exceed \$70,000.

BACKGROUND:

The Bedford Fire Department Emergency Medical Services (EMS) program responds to more than 5,100 calls for service annually. These calls for service include heart attacks, strokes, emergency child births, traumatic injuries, and many others. Paramedics must have the appropriate complement of medical supplies to meet the needs of their patients. Expendable medical supplies include items such as IV fluids, bandages, splints, disposable gloves, oxygen, emergency medications, and other items.

The Fire Department expects to spend between \$50,000 - \$70,000 annually on this type of inventory. However, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, spending for medical supplies, especially Personal Protective Equipment, has sharply increased this budget year. Purchases are routinely made throughout the year to best manage costs and inventory. A recent market and cost analysis identified Bound Tree Medical as one of the most cost-effective purchasing sources for many EMS expendable supplies. Cost savings are further enabled by use of the cooperative interlocal purchasing agreement with the City of Cedar Hill. The amount of spending with this vendor would not exceed \$70,000 in FY 2020.

The agreement between the City of Cedar Hill and Bound Tree Medical LLC is valid through February 28, 2021. The contract was renewed with Cedar Hill in the fall of 2018.

Funding for this item was included in the FY 2019-20 Budget. Any applicable budget overages due to COVID-19 will be submitted to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) for reimbursement.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends the following motion:

Approval of a resolution authorizing the Interim City Manager to purchase expendable medical supplies from Bound Tree Medical LLC, through an interlocal agreement with the City of Cedar Hill, in an amount not to exceed \$70,000.

WHEREAS, the City of Bedford, Texas, will work cooperatively with the City of Cedar Hill to purchase emergency medical supplies from Bound Tree Medical, LLC through an interlocal agreement; and,

WHEREAS, Bound Tree Medical is one of the most cost-effective purchasing sources for EMS expendable supplies.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BEDFORD, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That the findings above are found to be true and correct, and are incorporated herein.

SECTION 2. That the City Council hereby authorizes the Interim City Manager to purchase emergency medical supplies from Bound Tree Medical, LLC, through an interlocal agreement with the City of Cedar Hill, in an amount not to exceed \$70,000.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICE SUPPLIES AGREEMENT

This Emergency Medical Service Supplies Agreement (herein "Agreement") is made and entered into by and between the City of Cedar Hill, Texas, a Texas home rule municipal corporation (herein "City"), and Bound Tree Medical, LLC, an Ohio limited liability company (herein "Bound Tree") and shall be effective as of the date of execution set forth herein.

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, Bound Tree is a distributor of medical and pharmaceutical supplies; and

WHEREAS, the City operates an emergency medical service ("EMS") by and through its Fire Department; and

WHEREAS, the City's EMS requires the use of certain medical and pharmaceutical supplies ("medical supplies") to preserve and protect the public health and safety of the City's residents visitors; and

WHEREAS, Bound Tree bid on and was awarded a contract by the City under which Bound Tree agreed to sell medical supplies to the City's EMS for the period of March 1, 2013 through February 28, 2014 (the Original Agreement); and

WHEREAS, the Original Agreement was renewed for each of three optional one-year renewal terms; and

WHEREAS, the final renewal term of the Original Agreement ends on February 28, 2017; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to continue to procure medical supplies, by and through the City's EMS, to preserve and protect the public health and safety of its residents and visitors; and

WHEREAS, Bound Tree desires and agrees to continue supply the City's EMS with medical supplies subject to the terms of this Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises and covenants and conditions herein, the City and Bound Tree agree as follows:

1. Purchase and Sale of Medical Supplies. Bound Tree agrees to sell, and City agrees to purchase, medical supplies for the City's EMS pursuant to all of the terms and conditions of the Contract Documents as defined herein. In exchange for the City's use of Bound Tree as the City's medical supplies vendor, when said medical supplies can be delivered timely, Bound Tree will provide requested medical supplies to the City's EMS at the agreed-upon price and in the agreed-upon quantities as set forth in the Contract Documents.

2. Contract Documents. The Contract Documents referenced in and made part of this Agreement shall consist of the following:

- a. this Agreement
- b. the Invitation to Bid & Bid Specifications
- c. Bound Tree's Bid Quotation
- d. any written modifications or change orders agreed to by the City and Bound Tree.

The Invitation to Bid and Bid Specifications along with Bound Tree's Bid Quotation are attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein for all purposes.

3. Term. The term of this Agreement shall be one year beginning on March 1, 2017 and ending on February 28, 2018. This Agreement includes three (3) optional one-year renewal terms. The City shall have the right to renew this Agreement for any or all of the optional renewal terms under the same terms and conditions of this Agreement.

4. Termination. Notwithstanding the provisions in Section 3 above, the City may terminate this Agreement for any reason or no reason at all by providing Bound Tree with ninety (90) days prior written notice.

5. Payments. The City agrees to pay Bound Tree per the terms of the Contract Documents for orders from and delivered to the City's EMS.

6. Delivery. The City and Bound Tree agree that the City is not obligated to order a specific quantity of medical supplies and cannot supply Bound Tree with a forecast of the volume of medical supplies that the City's EMS will order. The City will, upon reasonable request from Bound Tree, and without the City binding itself in any way, provide short-term estimates of needed medical supplies to Bound Tree.

7. Acceptance of Medical Supplies. Acceptance or approval by the City or the City's EMS of any medical supplies under this Agreement shall not in any way relieve Bound Tree of responsibility for the any technical accuracy or quality of the fulfilment of any order for medical supplies from the City's EMS. The City's review, approval or acceptance of or payment for any medical supplies shall not be construed to operate as a waiver of any of the City's rights under this Agreement or any cause of action arising out of the performance or non-performance of this Agreement.

8. Indemnification. Bound Tree shall indemnify, save, and hold harmless the City and the City's EMS, its officials, officers, agents and employees with respect to any claims or demands, actions, damages, costs and expenses, including, without limitation, attorneys' fees and costs of litigation, arising from the death or injury of any person whomsoever, or any loss,

damage or destruction of any property whatsoever, resulting directly or indirectly from any intentional, negligent or grossly negligent act, error or omission of the Bound Tree, its agents, servants, employees or other persons acting on Bound Tree's behalf and arising from or related to Bound Tree's performance under this Agreement. This indemnity shall not be terminated or otherwise affected by reason of the termination or expiration of this Agreement.

9. Relationship of Parties. Bound Tree will use its own means and manner to perform its obligations under this Agreement and shall be deemed an independent contractor of the City. In no event shall this Agreement or any performance thereunder be deemed or interpreted as creating a principal-agent or joint venture relationship between the parties hereto. Neither party shall hold itself out as an agent of the other party, nor shall a party incur any indebtedness or obligations in the name of, or which shall be binding upon, the other party.

10. Notices. All notices and communications under this Agreement to be mailed or delivered to the City shall be sent to the address of the City EMS as follows, unless and until Bound Tree is otherwise notified:

11. Assignment. This Agreement shall not be assignable in whole or in part without the written consent of the City.

12. Dispute Resolution. If a dispute arises between the parties relating to this Agreement, the parties agree to use the following procedure prior to either party pursuing other available remedies:

a. A meeting shall be held promptly between the parties, attended by individuals with decision-making authority regarding the dispute, to attempt in good faith to negotiate a resolution of the dispute.

b. If, within thirty (30) days after such meeting, the parties have not succeeded in

negotiating a resolution of the dispute, they will appoint a mutually-acceptable mediator and agree to attend one, half day mediation with said mediator in an attempt to resolve the dispute. The parties shall share the fees of the mediator equally.

13. **WAIVER OF RIGHT TO TRIAL BY JURY.** BOUND TREE AND CITY AGREE THAT ALL DISPUTES ARISING FROM OR RELATED TO THIS AGREEMENT, INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO ANY AND ALL REPRESENTATIONS OR WARRANTIES, EXPRESSED OR IMPLIED, IF ANY, WHICH CANNOT BE RESOLVED THROUGH INFORMAL NEGOTIATIONS OR MEDIATION AS SET FORTH IN SECTION 12 ABOVE, SHALL BE RESOLVED BY WAY OF A TRIAL BEFORE A JUDGE OF A COURT OF COMPETENT JURISDICTION. BOUND TREE AND CITY EACH HEREBY WAIVE ANY AND ALL RIGHTS TO A TRIAL BY JURY. BOUND TREE AND CITY EACH HEREBY ACKNOWLEDGE AND REPRESENT THAT THEY HAVE KNOWINGLY AND VOLUNTARILY WAIVED THEIR RESPECTIVE RIGHTS TO A JURY TRIAL WITH RESPECT TO ANY LEGAL MATTER OR DISPUTE ARISING FROM OR RELATED TO THIS AGREEMENT.

14. Severability. Should any word, phrase, sentence, paragraph or other provision or portion of this Agreement be construed to be unlawful or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, such circumstance shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Agreement which shall remain in full force and effect.

15. Binding Effect. This Agreement shall be binding upon and enure to the benefit of the parties hereto and their respective permitted successors and permitted assigns.

16. Governing Law and Venue. This Agreement shall be governed by, and its provisions construed in accordance with, the laws of the State of Texas. Venue for any action arising from or related to this Agreement shall be the State District Courts of Dallas County, Texas.

17. Amendment and Waiver. No amendment or waiver of any provision of this Agreement, and no consent to any departure herefrom, shall be effective or binding unless and until set forth in a writing signed by each party, and then any such waiver or consent shall be effective only in a specific instance and for the specific purpose for which it was given. No notice or any other communication given by one party to the other party shall be construed to be or constitute an approval or ratification by the other party of any matter contained or referred to in such notice, unless the same be consented to by the other party in writing.

18. Entire Agreement. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the

parties, and there exist no other written or oral understandings, agreements or assurances with respect to any matters except as set forth herein. Unless expressly stated, this Agreement confers no rights to or upon any person or entity that is not a party hereto.

19. Legal Construction. Unless the context requires otherwise, words of the masculine gender shall be construed to include correlative words of feminine and neuter genders and vice versa, and words of the singular number shall be construed to include correlative words of the plural number and vice versa. The parties agree that this Agreement or any provision of this Agreement shall not be construed in favor of or against any party on the basis that the party did or did not authorize this Agreement or any provision hereto. This Agreement and all of the terms and provisions herein shall be liberally construed to effectuate the purposes set forth herein and to sustain the validity of this Agreement.



City Attorney Review: Yes

SUMMARY:

This item is to consider the purchase of an audio recording system for public safety radios and telephones in the PSAP (911 Center) to record radio and phone call conversations.

BACKGROUND:

The current recording system was purchased when the radio system converted from analog to digital systems and is approximately ten years old and has exceeded its life expectancy. The new system will be more reliable and have many new and convenient features that allow for faster play-back and retrieval of information. Communications operators rely on this type of recording system to retrieve information that may have been missed during the initial 911 call due to excitement of the caller, etc. The information recorded on this device may be utilized for administrative purposes, as well as in criminal investigations and enables dispatchers to relay important information to first responders prior to their arrival on scene.

The new system has functionality that better supports personnel in field. There is an incident reconstruction feature, which allows administrators to create a timeline of events of an incident. The system spans all forms of Next-Generation 911 communications in a single point; provides quality management function and text-to-speech features not available with the current system; and allows for routine updates, which facilitates compliance with all standards and best practices.

The estimated life of this device is eight years. Pricing for years two to eight have already been computed and would be paid out of that year's budget. This purchase was approved in the FY 2019/2020 budget.

Approval of a resolution authorizing the purchase of a NICE (brand) Inform and Telephony Logger System for public safety phones and radios from Motorola Solutions in the amount of \$90,200.

SYSTEM DESCRIPTION

1.1 SYSTEM OVERVIEW


1.3 NICE INFORM AND SUITE OF APPLICATIONS

NICE Inform uses Microsoft's .NET Windows Forms technology to provide automatic updates from the NICE Inform web server. This helps NICE combine low desktop support costs with feature-rich, high quality graphical user interfaces. The NICE Inform Applications are provided below along with specific capabilities.

Please note that not all features and functionalities described below may be proposed for City of Bedford.

- **Reconstruction** - the tool for search and replay of audio across the system. It consolidates into a graphical display video, audio, and other types of information recorded by NICE.
- **Organizer** - the tool for management and distribution of recordings and ancillary material. Organizer is an application that streamlines the recording distribution process.
- **Media Player** – the tool to share information with Inform and non-Inform users so that they can have a complete incident picture as the Reconstruction user does. Inform Media Player allows users like police investigators and attorneys to apply functionality like viewing pictures, and other multimedia items associated with the incident.
- **Monitor** - provides near real time access to ongoing calls. The NICE Inform Monitor application provides a way to listen to current activity on a group of channels.
- **Administrative Applications** – including: Audit Trail, User Administration and System Administration, for complete system and user administration.
- **NICE Inform Verify Application** - displays the recent call history, and is designed for call-takers and dispatchers who need to verify the event details.
- **NICE Inform Media Importer** – allows windows media audio files or 3rd party video clips to be imported into the timeline of the Inform application.

1.3.1 RECONSTRUCTION



Reconstruction provides a combination of graphical and list displays of the recordings – giving a visualization of the recordings and the detail to investigate more closely. Reconstruction includes many powerful features, designed and developed with the user in mind in order to facilitate an easy and effective work process. Some of these features are:

Playback Volume and Balance Control Per Recorded Channel - When replaying multiple audio channels mixed together and synchronized in real-time, users can dynamically control audio settings for each channel independently. Users can therefore quickly gain an understanding of both the incident communication as a whole and each audio recording individually.

Clipboard – The clipboard enables the user to keep a selection of search results on hand, while performing a new search or reviewing additional audio. The clipboard is particularly useful when the user finds that an incident involves a longer time frame or a wider number of channels than expected – all relevant audio from the first search can be placed on the clipboard, a new search performed with the new criteria and the combined results are now available for replay and further analysis.




Figure 2 - Clipboard

Annotations – During the review of the audio, users can add text and/or speech annotations to store further details or notes on the entire audio segment or on specific points in the recording. Annotations are marked as flags on the graphical view of recordings, so users can quickly refer to them. Bookmarks – annotations without text or speech – can also be added. Users can search for annotations at a later date, including annotations made with Last Message Replay.




Figure 3 - Annotations

1.3.2 ORGANIZER

Organizer is an advanced incident management module. Authorized users can store, access and manage multiple collections of specified recordings digitally replicated from the recorder that captured them. Recordings can be placed into an incident individually, or a collection of recordings can be given a name and managed collectively by that name. The incident storage area is independent from the normal recording storage area.

Audio that is within an incident can be replayed in just the same way as audio in the online store, with the same flexible user interface.




Figure 4- Incident List, Folders and Content Interfaces

The Organizer application includes further unique features:

Organization of Incident Information in Folders – This provides a central location where all the incident recordings and related information are stored. This saves time and reduces errors, as users can refer to one location for all incident information rather than to multiple sources. Incidents can be accessed from any workstation. An authorized user, who has been granted the appropriate access privileges, can refer to the folder quickly and save time and effort in reconstructing the incident audio again. User privileges to access specific incidents may be independently defined for each incident.

Comment/Notes Functionality – An authorized user has the ability to add notes to each incident folder and to individual recordings within the quarantine folder, providing an explanation or reason for the inclusion of that material in the incident.

Managing Additional Information – Any other files or documents related to the incident can be imported to the incident folder to maintain, manage and secure all information about an incident in a single location. For example, the audio request that generated the creation of the incident folder could be saved alongside the incident recordings to provide a single location for all data concerning the incident.

Automated Distribution Process – A wizard-guided distribution process simplifies the work for the user and wraps all incident material in one exported media file, including optional certification messages recorded by the user. Distribution profiles can be configured in advance to ensure consistency and repeatability when preparing audio for distribution. Profiles may be created for court purposes, where all audio is merged into a single file with certification messages added before and after the audio, or for investigative purposes, where all audio is kept separate and additional information is provided in an html page. Incidents may be distributed multiple times, in multiple formats, without the need to search the logging system each time.




Figure 5 - Distribution Wizard

Log of Distributed Material – This further enhances traceability of distributed material. If the incident information is requested again, the user can quickly find the original recreation in the Organizer application rather than go through the reconstruction and reproduction process again. If the distributed audio is questioned, for example, as to whether it is complete, the original recordings that made up the distributed audio are still available for reference and verification.

Distribution Authentication – When recordings are distributed they are saved as files in a folder that is given the name of the distribution. Also contained in this folder are other files that describe what the recordings contain. Each file that is saved has a hash code generated using the SHA-1 algorithm, which is stored in the NICE Inform server as part of the information kept about the distribution. To authenticate a distribution, the user opens the authentication dialogue and selects the relevant incident distribution folder. The distribution is then checked against the information stored on the server, including the quantity, names and recalculated hash codes of all the files in the distribution. The results of the verification, including any differences, are reported to the user.

Access Control to Evidence – Privilege-based access to incident folders is supported, with the ability to define unique user security access lists for each incident.

History of Actions – An audit trail is kept of every action taken on any of the recordings. This provides the ability to follow up and view actions taken by authorized users concerning the material of interest.

1.3.3 MONITOR APPLICATION

Monitor provides real time access to ongoing calls and a way to view real time activity on a group of channels. One or more channels can be optionally selected for monitoring and provides a local audio output on the workstation which is only a few seconds behind the actual conversation.




Figure 6 - NICE Inform Monitor

1.3.4 INFORM MEDIA PLAYER

The NICE Inform Media player is a true standalone application which enables the recipients of a distributed incident from the Organizer module to view the incident transactions in a synchronous format. It is distributed as an executable file negating the requirement to download it and therefore not imposing on any organizational IT security policies.

The display of the GUI is very similar to the Organizer view in order to provide continuity of the application branding but, more importantly, to provide an easy understanding between the distributor and the recipient of the material being reviewed. It has been designed with ‘review’ in mind. This means that all editing functionality has been removed in order to ensure that the distribution remains as a whole. The distribution has also been encrypted in order to enhance security of the content within the distribution (which in most cases is extremely sensitive).

Additionally, there is authentication associated with each of the files within the distribution and the Inform Media Player utilizes its own authentication function to detect whether files have been tampered with, deleted or modified in any way. It will then notify the reviewer and provide the option to continue opening the distribution, based on the fact that it may be incomplete.

Any related materials and associated notes with the incident folder are also forwarded to the recipient for review purposes.




Figure 7 - NICE Inform Media Player View




Figure 8 – NICE Inform 3rd Party importer Media Player View

1.3.5 VERIFY

NICE Inform Verify enables you to replay the last recordings (over a pre-defined search period) on up to fifty resources assigned to the position the logged in workstation is connected to. A position is a logical grouping of workstations and resources. You can **ONLY** see and replay recordings on resources that have been assigned to the position that your workstation is connected to. Positions are configured within the System Administration application within NICE Inform.



1.3.6 USER ADMINISTRATION

This application enables user administrators to set up system-wide and user-by-user security for the system. Each and every user (including administrators and maintenance staff) requires a security account, which is used to control access to all applications, application features and recording channels in the system.

Users are given permission to use NICE Inform applications by attaching a profile to them. The profile defines the applications and features the user can have. Without the profile, the user cannot access any functions. Profiles define the roles the users perform, such as Dispatcher or Call-Taker. The user administrator can override the profile for a specific user if required.

The principal activities involved with User Administration are:

- Configuration of user and system wide Security Policies (including password rules and logon banner)
- The creation, editing and deletion of users and groups, including privilege profiles
- The assignment of privileges to a profile, which can then be given to a user or user group




Figure 9– User Administration View

1.3.7 SYSTEM ADMINISTRATION

The application enables an authorized system administrator to install and set up the physical servers (such as recorders) and to label the system channels. Adding new objects into the system is simplified through the use of a context sensitive wizard to provide a logical, step-by-step approach. The application is split into two panes. The left-hand pane helps the user view the objects in the system and any configured grouping, particularly useful in larger systems such as ECTP with multiple loggers and sites. The right-hand pane details properties of the selected object, such as the list of channels associated with the object.

The principal tasks involved with System Administration include:

- The creation, editing and deletion of recording systems (or recorders)
- Assigning a user-specified name or label to each channel and pairing primary and secondary channels
- Creating groups of channels in order to enable subsequent security rights management of a group of channels as a single entity, for speed, accuracy and consistency




Figure 10 – System Administration View

1.3.8 ALARM NOTIFICATION AND TIME SYNCHRONIZATION

The primary mechanism of alarming for the system is via SNMP alerts. Hardware and software components are SNMP compliant (each with a custom MIB file) and provide real-time system monitoring and alerting to the SNMP Manager(s) provided with the system. The benefits of SNMP monitoring and alerting across the system include:

- Industry standard
- Enables multiple management clients to reside anywhere on the network
- Relatively simple implementation
- Relatively simple expandability and configuration
- Can be integrated with existing SNMP management systems

SNMP alerts are generated for internal and external alarms and warning events, such as:

- Failure of a redundant power supply in a conventional NiceLog
- Disk space low
- Inform user automatically logged out by system after inactivity time-out

SNMP Management Console, a third party application by Castle Rock, is optionally provided by NICE as a flexible and powerful tool for monitoring and acting upon SNMP events. A typical screen shot is shown below:




Figure 11 – SNMPc Management Console

NICE recommends that SNMP is monitored at the appropriate Operations Center. This can be with Castle Rock or with another standard SNMP client application. The NICE solution is designed to work with the network time synchronization protocol NTP. NICE recommends that at least one master clock source, synchronized by GPS or similar accurate method, is available. The Inform server can be configured to monitor the current time of the system components, and raise an alarm if a significant time difference is reported.

1.3.9 QUALITY MANAGEMENT

The NICE Quality Assurance solution is designed bottom up for Public Safety environments. It is part of the NICE Inform suite and administered here as well. An entire incident can be evaluated, from the 9-11 call through dispatch and also include audio and multimedia communication. Module includes evaluator, form designer to create browser based evaluation forms and a reporter module for statistical reporting.

1.3.10 SCREEN RECORDING

The NICE Screen Recorder solution captures and records every activity on each screen. Those recordings are available to NICE Inform for synchronization with other recorded multimedia information sources such as 9-1-1 calls, radio transmissions, video surveillance and Text-To-9-1-1, for a complete reconstruction of an incident. This provides an accurate understanding of how an event has unfolded,

NICE Screen Recording is done through the NICE Recording Platform. The same Platform used to capture audio and Text To - 9-1-1. This provides modularity and flexibility when expansion is required, as well as system management ease. Furthermore, replay of recorded screens can be integrated and viewed from any of the NICE Inform modules, including Reconstruction, Organizer, Evaluator and Media Player.

1.3.11 TEXT TO 9-1-1

Text logging is done by the NICE Recording system in compliance with NENA i3 standards supporting MSRP (Message Session Recording Protocol) and ATIS J-STD-110 standards. Text logging captures SMS and the text portion of an MMS. The NICE Text and Data Logging solution has been designed to extend your current logging system in two distinct ways: by building on the NICE Recording platform that is used for audio logging and screen logging, adding text and i3 data; and by seamlessly integrating with NICE Inform, allowing for multimedia incident information management, including: phone, radio, text, video, GIS, screen and other media.

Logging your text-to-9-1-1 communications is just one of the benefits your PSAP can enjoy with the NICE solution. Text logging includes message content, the texter's phone number, location information and timestamp per message. These fields can be used for searching for text interactions, including performing a search based on words mentioned in any of the text messages.




Figure 12– NICE Inform and Text to 911 View

STATEMENT OF WORK

The document delineates the general responsibilities between Motorola and the City of Bedford as agreed to by contract.

2.1 MOTOROLA RESPONSIBILITIES

Motorola's general responsibilities include the following:

- Install the new NICE NIR Server
- Perform the configuration of the Motorola/NICE supplied equipment described above.
- Perform the Optimization and Acceptance Test of the new equipment
- Coordinate the activities of all Motorola subcontractors under this contract.
- Administer safe work procedures for installation.
- Provide City of Bedford PD with the appropriate system interconnect specifications, *if required*.

2.2 CITY OF BEDFORD PD RESPONSIBILITIES

City of Bedford PD will assume responsibility for all other equipment and work necessary for completion of this project that is not provided by Motorola. City of Bedford PD general responsibilities include the following:

- Provide adequate space in the equipment room and rack required for system installation
- Insure the communication site meets space, grounding, power, and connectivity requirements for the installation of all equipment.
- Obtain all licensing, site access, or permitting required for project implementation, *if required*.
- Bedford PD will provide a dedicated delivery point, such as the designated site or a warehouse, for receipt, inventory and storage of the equipment prior to delivery to the final equipment room or location.
- Coordinate the activities of all City of Bedford PD vendors or other contractors.

Motorola has made a few assumptions in preparing this proposal, which are noted below. If any assumption is invalid, Motorola will need to provide an alternate solution based upon valid assumptions.

2.3 ASSUMPTIONS

- Motorola assumes that there is sufficient rack space in existing network equipment rooms to accommodate the proposed logging recorder hardware which includes an HP G10 Server.
- The proposed equipment will reuse existing Keyboard-Video-Monitor (KVM) equipment. This proposal does not include a KVM.
- There will be sufficient space and power at all proposed locations to install the proposed logging recorder.
- Any site/location upgrades or modifications are the responsibility of the customer.
- The City will provide the analog audio and VoIP feeds to the NIR server.
- No additional networking equipment is proposed. Motorola assumes existing networking hardware will be in place to accommodate the proposed logging equipment.
- The City will be responsible to assure with the CAD vendor that the NICE Screen agent is allowed to run on the CAD system.

LIFECYCLE SERVICES

Motorola will provide warranty services per our standard warranty terms and conditions as outlined within the Texas DIR-TSO-4101 contract. In addition to the Standard Commercial Warranty, the service products that comprise the Custom Warranty package are listed below along with a brief description.

NICE Logging Recorder

On Motorola's behalf, NICE Systems, Inc. will provide enhanced support services during the warranty period on the proposed NICE Logging system. Warranty support services will be enhanced to NICE's Gold Level of support, providing 24x7 on-site support services. These Gold Level support services are also available for purchase post-warranty.

This Gold Level bundle of NICE support services to be delivered is outlined below:

- Standard Warranty is One Year of 8 x 5 coverage (remote and on-site)...
- Gold Upgrades the Warranty to 24 x 7 remote and on-site support coverage
- Phone/Remote Support -Twenty-four (24) hours, seven (7) days per week
- On-Site Support -Twenty-four (24) hours, seven (7) days per week
- Callback Response time is Sixty (60) minutes after receipt of call from Motorola
- On-Site Response Time for Critical (Priority / Severity 1) issues is 4 hours

PRIORITY DEFINITIONS

Priority 1/ Critical - Critical Failure – In a 100% recording environment, any Failure of equipment, NICE software or communications to the NICE products which results in loss of recording channels or data, or if allowed to persist will result in such recording loss.

Priority 2 / High - Major Problem - Any problem resulting in loss of ability to retrieve calls or loss of replay functionality for majority of workstations and presented by the client as Major problem.

Priority 3 / Medium - Product Anomaly - Any problem affecting one or more workstations which does not result in a loss of recording or replay but nevertheless results in diminished Product response or performance. For example:

An administrator loses the ability to add or delete users.

Priority 4 / Low - System inquiry, planned intervention or request for information

Please note that priority levels and the associated response times only apply to warranted systems and customers who have purchased maintenance contracts on the NICE equipment. All non-warranted and Time/Materials (T&M) customers will require a purchase order. These calls will be managed by the resources available at that time.

Note: There are no post-warranty/maintenance services included as a part of this proposal.

3.2 SYSTEM UPGRADE AGREEMENT (SUA) II

The SUA II is a complete package of hardware, software and implementation services required to update the proposed NICE Inform and NIR telephony recording system to an eligible system release with an equivalent level of functionality.

As major NICE Inform and NIR software releases become available, the SUA II configuration covers up to one major release upgrade per every two-year contract term.

Major releases may include commercial OS and application software updates as well as NICE system release software to improve the system functionality and operation from previous releases as well as significant new feature enhancements that are available for purchase.

With each ASTRO system upgrade, the NICE SUA II may include upgrading the Inform User Application software to the Inform Release that is Motorola Ship Accepted at that time.

The SUA II agreement is for eight years and includes up to four software upgrades and up to one hardware upgrade during the contract.

The SUA II may provide for a like-for-like upgrade of the existing Inform applications and modules. It will not include additional or new Inform applications or licenses that the Customer did not have at the start of the SUA II contract. New/additional Inform applications and modules can be purchased separately at any time.

Any changes to the City's telephone/communication environment during the life of the SUA contract may require changes to the telephone logging interface. City changes to the telephone/communication environment are not covered in the SUA and may result in additional fees to accommodate the changes to the Logger interfaces and hardware. This includes, but is not limited to, upgrading the phone system to a newer version or changing the brand or model of the phone system.

ITEM:

Consider a resolution authorizing the Interim City Manager to adopt the North Central Texas Council of Governments Clean Fleet Policy supporting low emission vehicles, to include the adoption of an idle reduction standard operating procedure/policy by City personnel.

City Attorney Review: N/A

SUMMARY:

This item is to request authorization, in accordance with federal law, to adopt the North Central Texas Council of Governments Clean Fleet Policy supporting low emission vehicles and adopt an idle reduction standard operating procedure/policy for the City of Bedford.

BACKGROUND:

The City of Bedford has participated in a Clean Fleet Policy, under the guidelines of the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) Transportation Department, since 2000. Federal emissions standards changed in 2004 and modifications were made to the existing NCTCOG Clean Fleet Policy in 2005. In 2006, the City of Bedford adopted the current Clean Fleet Policy that further defined the goal of improving overall air quality through the reduction of vehicle emissions.

The Regional Transportation Council (RTC) is the regional transportation policy body associated with NCTCOG. They are responsible for transportation conformity and improving air quality. On December 11, 2014, the RTC approved a resolution revising the Clean Fleet Policy by entities with fleet operations in the nonattainment area, as designated by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). Tarrant County is identified within the boundaries of the 8-hour ozone nonattainment area, thus directly impacting vehicle operating procedures for the City of Bedford. The revision includes the adoption of an idle reduction standard operating procedure/policy (SOP) designed to aid in the reduction of vehicle emissions within the Dallas/Fort Worth metroplex. Emergency vehicles and equipment that are required to idle in order to operate auxiliary equipment, including lights, strobe or directional lighting or on-board refrigeration units, would be exempt from the idle reduction SOP.

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality indicated that in 2012, approximately 76% of the nitrogen oxides emissions and 25% of the volatile organic compound emissions in the Dallas/Fort Worth 8-hour ozone nonattainment area are attributed to mobile sources, such as vehicles. Benefits of adhering to a revised Clean Fleet Policy and adopting an idle reduction standard operating procedure/policy include reduced overall fuel consumption, reduced vehicle emissions, and improved air quality. Municipalities, school districts, counties, fleets contracted by municipalities, and state and federal agencies that adopt a Clean Fleet Policy, are eligible for potential grants and/or funding for vehicle projects and other strategies that improve air quality.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends the following motion:

Approval of a resolution authorizing the Interim City Manager to adopt the North Central Texas Council of Governments Clean Fleet Policy supporting low emission vehicles, to include the adoption of an idle reduction standard operating procedure/policy by City personnel.

WHEREAS, the City Council of Bedford, Texas recognizes that adopting a revised Clean Fleet Policy is necessary to protect the vitality of neighborhoods; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council of Bedford, Texas recognizes the importance of the use of low emission vehicles and the implementation of an idle reduction standard operating procedure/policy to improve air quality and reduce overall fuel consumption.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BEDFORD, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That the findings above are found to be true and correct, and are incorporated herein.

SECTION 2. That the Interim City Manager is hereby authorized to adopt the North Central Texas Council of Governments Clean Fleet Policy supporting low emission vehicles, to include the adoption of an idle reduction standard operating procedure/policy by City personnel.

CLEAN FLEET POLICY

WHEREAS, the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) has been designated as the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) for the Dallas-Fort Worth (DFW) Metropolitan Area by the Governor of Texas and in accordance with federal law; and,

WHEREAS, the Regional Transportation Council (RTC), comprised primarily of local elected officials, is the regional transportation policy body associated with NCTCOG and has been and continues to be the regional forum for cooperative decisions on transportation; and,

WHEREAS, NCTCOG has been designated as a Clean Cities Coalition for the DFW region by the US Department of Energy in accordance with federal law and the NCTCOG Executive Board authorized NCTCOG to serve as the host organization for the DFW Clean Cities (DFWCC) Coalition and its efforts; and,

WHEREAS, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has designated the DFW area as a nonattainment area for the pollutant ozone, and air quality impacts the public health of the entire region; and,

WHEREAS, emissions inventories from the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) indicate that in 2012, approximately 76 percent of the nitrogen oxides (NO_x) emissions and 25 percent of the volatile organic compounds (VOC) emissions in the DFW ozone nonattainment area are attributable to mobile sources; and,

WHEREAS, the RTC is responsible for transportation conformity; and the Clean Air Act Amendments of 1990 require that transportation plans and improvement programs in air quality nonattainment areas conform to the adopted State Implementation Plan (SIP); and,

WHEREAS, the RTC has adopted a resolution supporting the adoption and implementation of a Clean Fleet Policy by organizations with fleet operations in the DFW area; and reserves all future vehicle funding for entities that adopt and comply with a policy consistent with the provisions outlined below,

WHEREAS, the City of Bedford will set goals and provide workable, cost-effective solutions to improve air quality and reduce petroleum consumption in the DFW area, and implement those measures as practicable.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED:

Section 1.

The City of Bedford will reduce emissions from fleet activities by performing the following actions as practicable:

- 1.1** Implement an idle-reduction policy/standard operating procedure (SOP) that applies to all of the entity's vehicles and equipment, except where exempted as determined by <adopting entity>; communicate idle-reduction expectations to staff, vendors and visitors; and utilize idle-reduction technology.
- 1.2** Maximize use of vehicles and equipment with the lowest emissions wherever possible.

- 1.3 Ensure all conversions are EPA and/or California Air Resources Board (CARB) certified; ensure that aftermarket technologies are EPA and/or CARB verified, or are listed as an emerging technology by the EPA or a state environmental agency; and both conversions and aftermarket technologies are compatible with Texas Low Emission Diesel Program (TxLED) requirements.
- 1.4 Establish a plan to modify non-essential fleet activities on high ozone days to reduce air quality impacts.
- 1.5 Implement vehicle and equipment disposal strategies which minimize negative impacts on air quality.
- 1.6 Implement vehicle and equipment emissions inspection practices which meet or surpass the standards required by statute, including prompt resolution of any illuminated malfunction indicator lamp (MIL).

Section 2.

The City of Bedford will reduce overall fuel consumption, particularly the use of conventional petroleum fuels, by performing the following actions as practicable:

- 2.1 Pursue low-emission vehicles and equipment for acquisition, with an emphasis on alternative fuel, advanced technology, and/or SmartwaySM certified vehicles and equipment.
- 2.2 Improve overall fleet fuel efficiency.
- 2.3 Establish practices to reduce vehicle miles traveled, passenger miles traveled, engine hours, and/or ton miles traveled, as appropriate.

Section 3.

The City of Bedford will partner with the NCTCOG and DFWCC by performing the following actions as practicable:

- 3.1 Maintain membership and active participation in DFWCC and submit timely Clean Fleet Policy reporting.
- 3.2 Evaluate and consider participation in programs to test/commercialize/demonstrate new technologies to improve efficiency, reduce emissions, and/or increase fuel efficiency.
- 3.3 Pursue activities which support peer fleets' efforts to implement fuel- or emissions-reducing activities by sharing and maximizing resources.
- 3.4 Encourage fleet activities which minimize water, solid waste, or other environmental impacts of fleet activities, as appropriate.

Section 4.

The City of Bedford will ensure drivers/operators and fleet personnel are familiar with air quality and petroleum reduction goals by performing the following actions as practicable:

- 4.1 Provide in-house training and/or attending training administered by NCTCOG for fleet personnel and other staff involved in fleet decisions to

review policy elements and provide recommendations for achieving objectives.

4.2 Consider other mechanisms to increase understanding and awareness among fleet personnel and others.

The City of Bedford acknowledges that adoption of the Clean Fleet Policy, adoption of an idle reduction policy/SOP as outlined in section 1.1, submittal of both policies, and submittal of Clean Fleet Policy reporting is required to be eligible for future clean fleet funding from the RTC, and may be considered when determining other funding actions. The extent of Clean Fleet Policy implementation, as documented through reporting, will also be a factor in receiving DFWCC fleet recognition.

This policy shall be in effect immediately upon its adoption and replaces the prior Clean Fleet Vehicle Policy of the adopting entity.

SUMMARY:

On October 24, 2017, Public Works staff received approval by the City Council to submit a notice of intent to participate in a Sanitary Sewer Overflow Initiative (SSOI) agreement with the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ). Staff submitted the notice of intent and compliance plan to TCEQ for review. The SSOI agreement was received in March 2020 for execution by the City of Bedford, if approved by the City Council. The agreement would expire on September 30, 2028.

BACKGROUND:

The City of Bedford entered into a 5-year Sanitary Sewer Overflow Initiative (SSOI) agreement with the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) in February 2008 and requested extensions to the agreement until February 28, 2018. After successful completion of the initial SSOI agreement, staff requested approval to submit a notice of intent to participate in another SSOI with TCEQ. The request was approved on October 24, 2017 and the notice of intent and an initial compliance plan was submitted to TCEQ on November 12, 2018. A letter dated February 25, 2019 from TCEQ approved the plan and forwarded the documents to their Enforcement Division.

The SSOI agreement was received in March 2020 for execution by the City of Bedford, if approved by the City Council. The agreement would expire on September 30, 2028. The provisions of the agreement are as follows:

1. The Executive Director recognizes that by September 9, 2019, the City completed the Brown Trail Sewer Main Replacement project, which consisted of replacing 2,634 linear feet of sewer line and installing 14 manholes and 12 lengths of four-inch service lines.
2. By March 31, 2020, the City completed the Brook Hollow Park Sewer Realignment project, which consisted of realigning 500 linear feet of sewer line.
3. By September 30, 2020, the City shall complete a contracted Inflow and Infiltration study. The City shall submit a report of findings from the study and all proposed projects. The findings and proposed projects shall be submitted with the annual progress report, as set forth in Provision No. 7 below.
4. By September 30, 2020, and on a biannual basis thereafter until the end of the agreement, the City shall inform the public about fats, oils, and greases (FOG) as part of their FOG program. This includes placing information about FOG in the local newspaper, the Star-Telegram, or the City's local magazine, The Bedford Connection. The City will also perform education services and distribute information packets at local festivals and events at least twice a year.
5. By September 30, 2020, and on an annual basis thereafter until the end of the agreement, the City shall:
 - a) Perform high-pressure cleaning and maintenance on at least 184,000 linear feet, or 22%, of the System. The City shall submit a report of findings from the cleanings and any resulting projects or repairs.

- b) Inspect 605 manholes, or 22%, of all manholes within the System. The City shall submit a report of findings from the inspections and any resulting projects or repairs.
 - c) Utilize televised inspection equipment to inspect at least 16,500 linear feet, or 22%, of the System. The City shall submit a report of findings from the inspections and any resulting projects or repairs.
 - d) Administer a chemical root control program designed to deter root infiltration in the System. The City shall submit a report of findings from the program and any resulting projects or repairs.
6. The City shall evaluate the effectiveness of its corrective actions by:
- a) Analyzing flows and impacts of heavy rain events and unusually wet or dry periods;
 - b) Conducting televised inspections of high problem areas;
 - c) Evaluating the FOG program by documenting FOG related SSOs, volume of grease collected at drop off locations, and citizen feedback;
 - d) Conducting comprehensive follow-up investigations when unusually high quantities of root removal, or use of degreasers, are shown during investigations, and ensuring compliance with the City's Industrial Waste Ordinance; and
 - e) Enforcing the grease trap pumping requirements.
7. By September 30, 2020, and on an annual basis thereafter, the City shall submit a report to the TCEQ that contains information regarding the progress of the corrective actions contained in provisions 2 through 6. The reports shall include: 1) a summary of the number of SSOs that occurred (including dates, volume, and cause); 2) specific corrective actions that were completed; and 3) any proposed corrective actions that were delayed or not completed, including explanations why the actions were delayed or not completed. The report may be submitted on, or must contain the applicable information found in, the attached TCEQ SSO Agreement Annual Progress Report.
8. By September 30, 2028, which signifies the expiration date of this agreement, the City shall submit a written final report that contains the following:
- a) A summary of all corrective actions that have been completed in accordance with the provisions in this agreement;
 - b) A summary of all provisions in this agreement that were not completed, including reasons why specific corrective actions were delayed or not completed; and
 - c) A description of the overall improvements the corrective actions had on the System.
9. The Executive Director may grant an extension or modification to any provision of this Agreement upon a written and substantiated showing of good cause. All requests for extensions or modifications by the City shall be made in writing to the TCEQ. Extension or modifications are not effective until the City receives written approval from the TCEQ. The determination of what constitutes good cause rests solely with the TCEQ.
10. The City shall submit copies of all correspondence, reports, and documentation required by provisions 2 through 9.

In return for the City's agreement and adherence to these terms, the TCEQ will withhold further enforcement actions related to the noted deficiencies. Should unforeseen circumstances indicate a need to alter the above-mentioned schedule, the City must immediately notify the TCEQ so that an amendment can be discussed.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends the following motion:

Approval of a resolution authorizing the City of Bedford to execute an agreement for a 10-year Sanitary Sewer Overflow Outreach Initiative with the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Funding of \$370,000 for the Inflow and Infiltration study. Additional funding would be determined based on the results from the Inflow and Infiltration study.

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality ("TCEQ") is the state agency charged with enforcing TEX. WATER CODE ch. 26 (the "Code") and the regulations promulgated pursuant to the Code.

The City of Bedford ("the City") owns and operates a wastewater collection system located in Tarrant County, Texas (the "System").

The City has reported 12 unauthorized discharges as a result of sanitary sewer overflows ("SSOs") totaling 500 gallons during the period between March 1, 2019 and January 1, 2020. The majority of these discharges were due to grease blockages, non-flushable items, and root infiltration. The City will be required to rehabilitate the System to ensure a reduction of risk to the public health and the environment and to comply with TCEQ requirements.

PROVISIONS

In response to these deficiencies and in an effort to eliminate the potential threat to public health, the City and the TCEQ have entered into an Agreement. This Agreement formalizes the commitments made by the City in its letter to the TCEQ dated November 12, 2018 and updates provided on March 8, 2019 and January 13, 2020 by David Smyth, Field Operations Manager (see Attachment A). The provisions of this Agreement are as follows:

1. The Executive Director recognizes that by September 9, 2019, the City completed the Brown Trail Sewer Main Replacement project which consisted of replacing 2,634 linear feet of sewer line and installing 14 manholes and 12 lengths of four inch service lines.
2. By March 31, 2020, the City shall complete the Brook Hollow Park Sewer Realignment project which consists of realigning 500 linear feet of sewer line.
3. By September 30, 2020, the City shall complete a contracted Inflow and Infiltration study. The City shall submit a report of findings from the study and all proposed projects. The findings and proposed projects shall be submitted with the annual progress report, as set forth in Provision No. 7 below.
4. By September 30, 2020, and on a biannual basis thereafter until the end of the Agreement, the City shall inform the public about fats, oils, and greases ("FOG") as part of their FOG program. This includes placing information about FOG in the local newspaper, the Bedford Connection. The City will also perform educational services and distribute information packets at local festivals and events at least twice a year.

All requests for extensions or modifications by the City shall be made in writing to the TCEQ. Extensions or modifications are not effective until the City receives written approval from the TCEQ. The determination of what constitutes good cause rests solely with the TCEQ.

SUMMARY:

The City of Bedford is an electric utility customer of Oncor Electric Delivery Company LLC (Oncor) and a regulatory authority with an interest in the rates and charges of Oncor. The City is also a member of the Steering Committee of Cities Served by Oncor (OCSC), a membership of similarly situated cities served by Oncor that have joined together to efficiently and cost effectively review and respond to electric issues affecting rates charged in Oncor's service area. On April 3, 2020, Oncor filed with the City an Application for Approval to Amend its Distribution Cost Recovery Factor (DCRF) rate. This resolution denies the request while the application is reviewed by consultants and attorneys to resolve any issues in the application.

BACKGROUND:

The City is an electric utility customer of Oncor Electric Delivery Company LLC (Oncor or Company). The Oncor Cities Steering Committee (OCSC) is a coalition of similarly situated cities served by Oncor that have joined together to efficiently and cost effectively review and respond to electric issues affecting rates charged in Oncor's service area in matters before the Public Utility Commission (PUC or Commission) and the courts.

On April 3, 2020, Oncor filed an Application to Amend its Distribution Cost Recovery Factor (DCRF) with each of the cities retaining original jurisdiction and with the Commission in Docket No. 50734. In the filing, the Company sought to increase distribution rates by \$75.9 million annually (an approximately \$0.88 increase to the average residential customer's bill).

The resolution authorizes the City to join with OCSC to evaluate the filing, determine whether the filing complies with law, and if lawful, to determine what further strategy, including settlement, to pursue. In the meantime, the resolution denies the rates as filed and directs Oncor to continue charging existing rates to customers within the City.

SUMMARY:

This item is a request for a specific use permit (SUP) to allow Mian Ahmed with Prestige Cigars and Tobacco, to rezone 3225 Harwood Road, Suite D and E from Light Commercial (L) to Light Commercial/Specific Use Permit (L/SUP) for the operation of a Tobacco Products Store - Prestige Cigars and Tobacco, at this location. The Planning and Zoning Commission recommended approval of this application at their March 12, 2020 meeting, with the stipulation that no vaping products will be sold or used on the premises.

BACKGROUND:

The subject property is located on Harwood Road just east of Martin Drive and west of SH 121. The lot has a multi-tenant retail building, with approximately seven tenant spaces. The cigar shop is currently located in Suite E consisting of 913 square feet of space, and is proposing to be combined with Suite D (formerly Subway) consisting of 1,074 square feet of space to give the tobacco store a total of 1,987 square feet of space within the same strip retail center. The addition of Suite D for the new combined tenant space requires the approval of a new specific use permit (SUP). The applicant is requesting to rezone the new Suite D and E, allowing for the operation of a Tobacco Products Store.

The Zoning Ordinance defines Tobacco Products Store as follows:

TOBACCO PRODUCTS STORE - A retail establishment that includes on premise sales and consumption or sales for off-premise consumption, in whole or in part, to the smoking of tobacco or other substances such as vapor, electronic cigarette, e-cigarette, liquid nicotine, and includes any establishment that allows either the payment of consideration by a customer to the establishment for on-site delivery of tobacco, tobacco accessories or similar substances and products to the customer; and, the onsite smoking of tobacco or other substances. This definition shall be construed to include establishments known variously as retail tobacco stores, tobacco products shops, hookah cafes, tobacco clubs, tobacco bars, cigar stores and similar establishments, but shall not include an establishment which derives more than fifty (50) percent of its gross revenue from food, beverage, or gasoline fuel sales.

Minimum Specific Use Permit Conditions (In addition to a Site Plan and a Public Hearing):

- No additional conditions

The Planning and Zoning Commission recommended approval of this application at their March 12, 2020 meeting, with the stipulation that no vaping products will be sold or used on the premises.

- SECTION 7. That any person, organization, corporation, partnership or entity that violates, disobeys, omits, neglects or fails to comply with the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not more than two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) for each offense or violation. Each day that an offense or violation occurs shall constitute a separate offense.
- SECTION 8. That this ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after its passage in accordance with the provisions of the Charter of the City of Bedford and the laws of the State of Texas.



SUMMARY:

This item is to request approval to enter into a professional services agreement with David Pettit Economic Development, in the amount of \$75,000, to create a Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone (TIRZ) around the central Bedford City Hall area. The scope of work will include working with architecture firm Good Fulton and Farrell to review the district, collect data, conduct a taxable value analysis, develop a TIRZ cash flow model, prepare a project and financing plan, and provide documentation support for the TIRZ approval process.

BACKGROUND:

On February 20, 2020, the City Council held a work session to discuss economic development. A major component of that discussion involved a presentation and discussion with David Pettit of David Pettit Economic Development regarding economic development concepts, practices, and strategies. It was determined at the meeting that a Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone (TIRZ) be created around the central Bedford City Hall area to help promote new development and redevelopment in the area.

The TIRZ process is a method local governments can use to pay for improvements that will draw private investment to an area. Tax increment financing is not a new tax; instead, it redirects some of the ad valorem tax from property in a geographic area designated as a Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone (TIRZ) to pay for improvements in the zone. Tax Code Chapter 311 governs tax increment financing.

Future tax revenues from each participating taxing unit that levies taxes against a property are used to pay for the cost of improvements to an area. Each taxing unit may dedicate all, a portion of, or none of the tax revenue that is attributable to increased property values brought about by improvements within the reinvestment zone. The additional tax revenue received from the affected properties is referred to as the tax increment. Each taxing unit determines what percentage of its tax increment, if any, it will commit to repayment of the cost of financing the public improvements.

Chapter 311 of the Texas Tax Code outlines the various procedures for creating a TIRZ. The designation TIRZ ordinance is approved by the governing body of the municipality and establishes four key elements, including:

- Boundary;
- Term;
- TIRZ Board; and
- Preliminary project and financing plan.

Before adopting an ordinance designating the reinvestment zone, the governing body of the municipality must hold a public hearing on the creation of the zone and publish notice of the hearing not later than the seventh day before the public hearing. A final project and financing plan is subsequently approved by the TIRZ Board and then by the governing body of the municipality.

David Pettit Economic Development (DPED) specializes in assisting municipalities navigate the process of creating a TIRZ. Along with certain services provided by the architect, the TIRZ creation process is broken down into the following core tasks:

Task 1 District Review

Work with the Architect to collect and analyze available information in the proposed TIRZ. This includes available development data; existing planning documents, such as the comprehensive plan, land use plan, thoroughfare plan, and most current strategic plan; physical information, such as existing zoning and land use, existing and planned infrastructure, and topography; and property data, such as ownership and tax values.

Task 2 Data Collection and Analysis

Based upon parcel data provided by the City, DPED would provide a Geographic Information System (GIS) database of existing values for land and improvements, ownership data, and current land use information. The database and maps will provide the baseline data for the analysis. Key products of this task would include a TIRZ database and accompanying maps in digital and hard copy formats.

Task 3 Taxable Value Analysis

DPED will utilize the conceptual master plan prepared by the Architect, relying on the project data for each development shown to create a multi-year historic taxable value projection. This projection will take into account a review of similar developments that will establish conservative assumptions of future taxable value. This task will be the basis for developing a spreadsheet model of potential TIRZ increments, given a reasonable range of development assumptions and taxable values. Key products of this task would include a spreadsheet model with projections based upon the historical taxable value review, provided land use plan, and reasonable timing expectations.

Task 4 Develop TIRZ Cash Flow Model

Based on the anticipated land uses and projections, DPED would develop a draft financing cash flow model (and supporting spreadsheets) for a 15, 20, and 30-year time period. This model will allow the City, consultants and others to underwrite the proposed developments and test various scenarios for the eventual financing plan. Key products of this task would include Excel spreadsheets of TIRZ Cash Flow Models with macros established for growth and development assumptions.

Task 5 Prepare TIRZ Project and Financing Plan

DPED would then develop the Finance Plan, Project Plans, Detailed Description of TIRZ, and other exhibits required for local government review and approval per the state legislative requirements. This work includes the written, graphic, and PowerPoint materials and exhibits, as well as support of the process. Backup materials such as spreadsheets and databases will also be products that support the plans. Key products would include a preliminary TIRZ Project and Financing Plan comprised of a legal description of the zone, proposed TIRZ projects, estimated project costs, term of the zone, and a tax increment analysis.

Task 6 TIRZ Documentation Support

DPED will provide assistance with drafting necessary documents for creating the TIRZ, including: 1) public hearing notices; 2) resolutions; and 3) ordinances. This can be a time-consuming process for City staff; however, DPED's extensive experience in drafting these documents should help streamline the preparation of materials necessary for City Council consideration. This task would also include assistance in creating and appointing the appropriate TIRZ board per the TIRZ creation ordinance.

If approved, funding will come from the FY 2019/2020 Economic Development Fund.

David Pettit Economic Development, LLC ("DPED") is pleased to provide this proposal for economic development professional services relating to the creation of a Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone ("TIRZ") in the City of Bedford, Texas ("City").

The Project

It is our understanding that the City of Bedford, Texas is interested in creating a TIRZ for the purpose of facilitating development.

The Assignment

Our work under this proposal would be to provide economic development. DEPD's primary role will be to provide professional economic development services relating to creating a TIRZ.

The Team

We proposed working in a team organized as follows:

- You will be our point of contact and will provide overall direction to our team. You may also include other members of City staff with which we will meet regularly to review our progress and to get input and direction on our work.
- DPED will subcontract with GFF Planning ("Architect") to provide master planning services.

Statutory Requirements

Chapter 311 of the Texas Tax Code outlines the various procedures for creating a TIRZ. The designation TIRZ ordinance is approved by the governing body of the municipality and establishes four key elements, including:

- Boundary;
- Term;
- TIRZ Board; and
- Preliminary project and financing plan.

Before adopting an ordinance designating the reinvestment zone, the governing body of the municipality must hold a public hearing on the creation of the zone and publish notice of the hearing not later than the seventh day before the public hearing. A final project and financing plan is subsequently approved by the TIRZ Board and then by the governing body of the municipality.

Scope of Services

Based on our conversations and our experience on previous projects, we propose the following scope of services for the role of the Architect and DPED's creation of the TIRZ. Each proposed scope of services is divided into separate tasks, each providing a description of the work to be performed and key products resulting from the task.

Architect Scope of Services

Task 1

- GFF will first visit the site as a walking and drive-by reconnaissance of the properties (based on 2 GFF staff) to gain a good understanding of both the existing site conditions and adjacent context.
- GFF will research the work prepared to date, then prepare a series of base maps that comprise the work to date that shall serve as a precedent for a new conceptual master plan.
- GFF will conduct with DPED a half-day charrette, or public meeting (based on 2 GFF staff) that includes City elected leadership, planning staff and key stakeholders to discuss market conditions for the site and specific development opportunities, with a particular focus on multi-family, townhomes, and commercial development.
- The output from the half-day charrette will be summarized in a short-bound report, incorporating the above maps, drawing sketches and verbal comments. Additionally, a single land use or preliminary site plan with acreages, roadway alignments, open space allocation and very preliminary site planning will be prepared for this report. This plan will be in hand drawn format.
- GFF will conduct with DPED a meeting (based on 2 GFF staff) with the above group to discuss this output.

Task 2

- GFF will prepare a master plan in hand drawn format that is color coded, with project data for each development shown.
- GFF will prepare a phasing plan that depicts the incremental developmental approach to how the subject properties might be phased.
- GFF will facilitate a meeting, or up to three separate meetings (based on 2 GFF staff) between the City's elected leadership, key City staff and key vertical developers that may be interested parties to development opportunities as depicted in the master plan.

DPED would then develop the Finance Plan, Project Plans, and Detailed Description of TIRZ, and other exhibits required for local government review and approval per the state legislative requirements. This work includes the written, graphic, and PowerPoint materials and exhibits, as well as support of the process. Backup materials such as spreadsheets and databases will also be products that support the plans. Key products would include a preliminary TIRZ Project and Financing Plan comprised of a legal description of the zone, proposed TIRZ projects, estimated project costs, term of the zone and a tax increment analysis.

Task 6

TIRZ Documentation Support

DPED will provide assistance with drafting necessary documents for creating the TIRZ including: 1) public hearing notices; 2) resolutions; and 3) ordinances. This can be a time consuming process for City staff, however DPED's extensive experience in drafting these documents should help streamline the preparation of materials necessary for City Council consideration. This task would also include assistance in creating and appointing the appropriate TIRZ board per the TIRZ creation ordinance.

Fee for Services

The fee for services relating to both the Architect's and DPED's scope of services described above would be a lump sum fee of \$75,000.

Fees would be charged on a monthly basis, subject to on-going progress on the work effort. Reimbursable expenses not to exceed \$1,500 would be charged to include out-of-pocket expenses incurred in the interest of the project at actual costs.

Changes of Scope and Additional Services

Minor additions to our scope will be treated as Additional Services. Work on Additional Services will not begin until authorized in writing by the Client.

Additionally, Client may terminate this Agreement for any reason upon thirty (30) days written notice to DPED and DPED will cease any and all work upon receipt of such notice, unless otherwise directed in the notice. In the event of a termination as described above, Client shall be responsible for the payment of the fees and expenses incurred by DPED pursuant to this agreement through the date of such termination.

Reimbursables

Invoices and Payments

Payment for services rendered is due within thirty (30) days of Client’s next monthly billing cycle following receipt of invoice. In the event any invoices remain unpaid 45 days after the invoice date, we suspend work until we have been paid in full all amounts due for services and expenses. Amounts unpaid for more than 30 days after the due date may accrue interest at 10% per annum. In the event we are forced to commence a collection proceeding, you agree to pay reasonable attorney's fees and court costs, in addition to our fees billed under this proposal.

Suspension and Termination

If the project is suspended or abandoned, DPED will be compensated for all services billed prior to receipt of written notice by the Client. Services that are not billed or completed between billing periods and receipt of written notice will be reimbursed at DPED's standard hourly rates.

If the scope or schedule of the project should change beyond that to be reasonably expected due to the program changes, schedule or other reason, at their option, DPED may re-negotiate the aforementioned fees and scope of work. Any renegotiation of scope or fee will be in writing and subject to the signing of both parties.

Certifications

Guarantees and Warranties: We will not be required to execute any document that would result in our certifying, guaranteeing or warranting the existence of conditions whose existence we cannot ascertain.

Authorization to Proceed

PRESENTER: Kenneth Overstreet, Director of Public Works **DATE:** 04/28/20

Council Mission Area: Be responsive to the needs of the community.

ITEM:

Consider a resolution authorizing the Interim City Manager to enter into a professional services agreement with Halff and Associates, Inc., in the amount of \$184,400, for the design of the West Pipeline Road Water and Sanitary Sewer Replacements between Arwine Cemetery Road and Raider Drive Project.

City Attorney Review: Yes

SUMMARY:

The City of Euless entered into a design agreement with Halff and Associates, Inc. for the reconstruction of Pipeline Road from Arwine Cemetery Road to Raider Drive and plan to begin the reconstruction after the water and sewer lines have been completed and Atmos has replaced a 16-inch gas main. The City of Bedford has water and sanitary sewer main lines under the roadway that are in need of replacement. Due to the City of Bedford utilizing SWIFT funding for the water main line replacement, and the requirements required by the Texas Water Development Board, it was decided that the City of Bedford should complete the design and utility construction prior to the City of Euless beginning the road reconstruction. This item is requesting approval to enter into a professional services agreement with Halff and Associates, Inc. for the design of the water and sewer replacements. The project would also include modifications to the Forest Ridge Drive traffic signal to comply with ADA regulations and new sidewalks along the north side of the road between Gettysburg Place and Raider Drive.

BACKGROUND:

The City of Euless entered into a design agreement with Halff and Associates, Inc. for the reconstruction of Pipeline Road from Arwine Cemetery Road to Raider Drive. The City of Bedford has water and sanitary sewer main lines under the road that are in need of replacement prior to the road reconstruction occurring. Staff met with representatives from the City of Euless and determined that it would be in the best interest of both parties for the City of Bedford to complete the design and replacement of the water and sanitary sewer lines independently. The primary reason for this is due to the Texas Water Development Board requirements for SWIFT funded projects.

The project will included the replacement of an 8” water line from 20 feet west of Arwine Cemetery Road east to Raider Drive, replacement of all sanitary sewer lines and manholes, necessary modifications to the Forest Ridge Drive traffic signal to comply with ADA regulations, and new sidewalks along the north side of West Pipeline Road between Gettysburg Place and Raider Drive.

The scope of services for the design are:

- **Surveying.** Not included in this contract, but performed under separate contract with the City of Euless.
- **Subsurface Utility Engineering (SUE).** The Consultant will perform SUE in accordance with ASCE CI/ASCE 38-02 “Standard Guidelines for the Collection and Depiction of Existing Subsurface Utility Data.”
- **Construction Plans.** The Consultant shall develop construction plans for review, permitting, bidding, construction, inspection, and record keeping. In general, construction plans shall be consistent with normal practice for projects of this nature.

- **Bidding, Construction, Closure.**
 - **Bidding** – During the bidding phase, the Consultant will assist the City by addressing technical questions and preparing draft addenda for issuance by the City. The Consultant will attend the pre-bid meeting.
 - **Construction** – The Consultant’s design engineer and/or project manager shall attend the pre-construction meeting. The Consultant shall assist the City in the preparation of field changes and/or change orders, which may become necessary for the orderly completion of the project. The Consultant shall assist the City in performing a final walk-through inspection and prepare a written “final punch list”.
 - **Closure** – The Consultant shall prepare record drawings, incorporating all changes provided by the Contractor and known variations to provide the City the best possible set of record drawings. The final record drawings shall be furnished on paper, of the same specification as provided for in the Agreement, on CD, and in CADD format.
- **Additional Services.** Other additional services, not included in the Scope of Services, will be negotiated with the City as needed. Compensation will be based upon a mutually agreed lump sum fee or an hourly rate.

Staff recommends Halff and Associates, Inc. for the design of this project. The City of Bedford recently entered into multiple engineering agreements with the firm to include: Boys Ranch Phase Next, Forest Ridge Drive water line design, City Engineering services, and drainage engineering assistance. Halff and Associates, Inc. are also the design engineers for the City of Euless for the Pipeline Road street reconstruction.

If approved, funding will be paid from the 2015 Certificates of Obligation Bond (SWIFT), the Utility Repair Fund, and the remaining budgeted balance from the Tarrant County asphalt overlay projects in the Street Improvement Economic Development Corporation Fund.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends the following motion:

Approval of a resolution authorizing the Interim City Manager to enter into a professional services agreement with Halff and Associates, Inc., in the amount of \$184,400, for the design of the West Pipeline Road Water and Sanitary Sewer Replacements between Arwine Cemetery Road and Raider Drive Project.

THIS AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is made and entered into by and between the City of Bedford, Texas, a home-rule municipality ("City"), and **Halff Associates, Inc.**, a Texas Corporation ("Consultant"), to be effective from and after the date as provided above. City and Consultant are at times each referred to herein as a "party" or collectively as the "parties."

WHEREAS, City desires to engage the services of Consultant to provide professional civil engineering services for **W. Pipeline Road Water and Sanitary Sewer Replacements between Arwine Cemetery Road and Raider Drive** ("Project"); and

WHEREAS, Consultant desires to render such professional services ("Services") for City on the terms and conditions provided herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, KNOW ALL PERSONS BY THESE PRESENTS:

That for and in consideration of the covenants contained herein, for the mutual benefits to be obtained hereby and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties agree as follows:

**ARTICLE 1
CONSULTANT'S SERVICES**

- 1.1 **Employment of Consultant** – City hereby agrees to retain Consultant to perform the Services in connection with the Project. Consultant agrees to perform the Services in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement. Consultant further agrees that if any employee of Consultant who is performing the day-to-day Services under this Agreement for the Project is separated, for any reason, from employment with Consultant, Consultant shall provide City with written notice thereof at least five (5) business days' prior to said separation unless circumstances reasonably warrant a shorter notice period, which shall not exceed two (2) business days following the separation.
- 1.2 **Scope of Services** – The parties agree that Consultant shall perform the Services as are set forth and described in **Exhibit A**, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference for all purposes ("**Scope of Services**"). The parties understand and agree that deviations or modifications to the Scope of Services described in **Exhibit A**, in the form of written change orders, may be authorized from time to time by City ("**Change Order(s)**").
- 1.2.1 **Requirement of Written Change Order** – "Extra" work, "claims" invoiced as "extra" work or "claims" which have not been issued as a duly executed, written Change Order by the Bedford City Manager will not be authorized for payment and/or shall not become part of the subcontracts. A duly executed, written Change Order shall be preceded by the Bedford City Council's authorization for the Bedford City Manager to execute said Change Order.
- 1.2.2 **CONSULTANT SHALL NOT PERFORM ANY "EXTRA" WORK AND/OR ADDITIONAL SERVICES WITHOUT A DULY EXECUTED, WRITTEN CHANGE ORDER ISSUED BY THE BEDFORD CITY MANAGER** – Project Managers, Superintendents and/or Inspectors of City are not authorized to issue verbal or written Change Orders.
- 1.3 **Schedule of Work** – Consultant agrees to commence work immediately on the execution of this Agreement, and to proceed diligently with said work to completion

as described in the Project Budget Summary, attached hereto as **Exhibit B** and incorporated herein by reference for all purposes.

- 1.4 **Standard of Care** – Consultant shall perform the Services required hereunder in accordance with the prevailing engineering standard of care by exercising the skill and care ordinarily utilized by engineers performing the same or similar services under the same or similar circumstances in the State of Texas.

ARTICLE 2 CITY'S RESPONSIBILITIES

City shall do the following in a timely manner so as not to delay the Services of Consultant:

- 2.1 **Project Data** – City shall furnish required information that is reasonably requested by Consultant and that City has in its possession at the time of Consultant's request, as expeditiously as necessary for the orderly progress of the Project, and Consultant shall be entitled to rely upon the accuracy and completeness of the information furnished by City under this Article 2.1.
- 2.2 **City Project Manager** – City shall designate, when necessary, a representative authorized to act on City's behalf with respect to the Project ("Project Manager"). City or the authorized Project Manager shall examine the documents submitted by Consultant and shall render any required decisions pertaining thereto as soon as practicable so as to avoid unreasonable delay in the progress of the Consultant's Services. The Project Manager is not authorized to issue verbal or written Change Orders for "extra" work or "claims" invoiced as "extra" work.

ARTICLE 3 CONSULTANT'S COMPENSATION

- 3.1 **Compensation for Consultant's Services** – As described in "Article 1, Consultant's Services" of this Agreement, compensation for this Project shall be: (a) for Basic Services, on a lump sum basis in an amount not to exceed **ONE HUNDRED EIGHT-FOUR THOUSAND FOUR HUNDRED AND 00/100 DOLLARS (\$184,400.00)**; and (b) for Special Services, on cost-plus basis in an amount not to exceed **ZERO DOLLARS (\$0.00)** (collectively, "Consultant's Fee"); and (c) shall be paid in accordance with this Article 3 and the Project Budget Summary as set forth in Exhibit B.
 - 3.1.1 **Completion of Record Documents** – City and Consultant agree that the completion of Record Documents and/or "As-Built" Documents, including hard copy formatting and electronic formatting, shall be completed, submitted to, and accepted by City prior to payment. Completion of the Record Documents and/or "As-Built" documents shall be included in the Consultant's Fee and considered to be within the Scope of Services defined

under this Agreement.” The electronic formatting shall be consistent with the standards established in **Exhibit C**, Guidelines for Computer Aided Design and Drafting (“CADD”), which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference for all purposes.

3.1.2 **Disputes between City and Construction Contractor** – If the Project involves Consultant performing Construction Administration Services relating to an agreement between a Construction Contractor (“**Contractor**”) and City, and on receipt of a written request by City, Consultant shall research previous and existing conditions of the Project, and make a determination whether or not to certify that sufficient cause exists for City to declare Contractor in default of the terms and conditions of the Agreement. Consultant shall submit his findings in writing to City, or submit a written request for a specific extension of time (including the basis for such extension), within fifteen (15) calendar days of receipt of the written request from City. City and Consultant agree that if requested by City, completion of this task shall be included in the Consultant’s Fee and considered to be within the Scope of Services as defined under this Agreement.

3.1.3 **Consultation and Approval by Governmental Authorities and Franchised Utilities** – Consultant shall be solely responsible for identifying and analyzing the requirements of governmental agencies and all franchise utilities involved with the Project, and for consulting with such agencies and utilities to obtain all necessary approvals and/or permissions. Consultant shall be responsible for preparation and timely submittal of documents required for review, approval and/or recording by such agencies and/or utilities. Consultant shall be solely responsible for making such changes in the construction documents (“Construction Documents”) as may be required by existing written standards promulgated by such agencies and/or utilities at no additional charge to City.

3.2 **Direct Expenses** – Direct Expenses (“**Direct Expenses**”) are included in Consultant’s Fee as described in **Article 3.1** of this Agreement and include actual reasonable and necessary expenditures made by Consultant and Consultant’s employees and subcontractors in the interest of the Project. All submitted Direct Expenses are to be within the amounts as stated in the Project Budget Summary set forth in **Exhibit B**, and consistent with **Exhibit D**, Guidelines for Direct Expenses; General and Administrative Markup; Travel and Subsistence Expenses, which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference for all purposes. Consultant shall be solely responsible for the auditing and accuracy of all Direct Expenses, including those of its subcontractors, prior to submitting to City for reimbursement. Any over-payment by City for errors in submittals for reimbursement may be deducted from Consultant’s subsequent payment for Services; provided, however, that this shall not be City’s sole and exclusive remedy for said over-payment.

3.3 **Additional Services** – Consultant shall provide the Services as described in the Scope of Services set forth in **Exhibit A** of this Agreement. If authorized in writing by City, Consultant shall provide additional services, to be compensated as provided in an Amendment to the Contract on a cost not to exceed sum or hourly basis in accordance with this paragraph (“Additional Services”) and a mutually agreed estimate of man-hours and expenses. These services may include, but are not limited to:

- i. Additional meetings, hearings, work-sessions or other similar presentations which are not provided for or contemplated in the Scope of Services described in **Exhibit A**.
- ii. Additional drafts and revisions to the Project which are not provided for or contemplated in the Scope of Services as described in **Exhibit A**.
- iii. Additional copies of final reports and construction plans which are not provided for or contemplated in the Scope of Services as described in **Exhibit A**.
- iv. Photography, professional massing models which are not provided for or contemplated in the Scope of Services as described in **Exhibit A**.
- v. Compensation for Additional Services authorized by City shall be in addition to Consultant’s Fee and shall be based on direct billable labor rates and expenses.
- vi. Compensation for Additional Services authorized by City shall be in addition to Consultant’s Fee and shall be based on an hourly basis according to the following personnel rates. The rates set forth in this chart are subject to reasonable change provided prior written notice of said change is given to and approved by City.

- 3.4 **Invoices** – No payment to Consultant shall be made until Consultant tenders an invoice to City. Consultant shall submit monthly invoices for Services rendered, based upon the actual percentage of work complete at the time the invoice is prepared, or shall submit invoices to City immediately upon completion of each individual task listed in **Exhibit B**. On all submitted invoices for Services rendered, Consultant shall include appropriate background materials to support the submitted charges on said invoice. Such background material shall include, but is not limited to, employee timesheets, invoices for work obtained from other parties, and receipts and/or log information relating to Direct Expenses. All invoices shall provide a summary methodology for administrative markup and/or overhead charges.
- 3.5 **Timing of Payment** – City shall make payment to Consultant for said invoices within thirty (30) days following receipt and acceptance thereof. The parties agree that payment by City to Consultant is considered to be complete upon mailing of payment by City. Furthermore, the parties agree that the payment is considered to be mailed on the date that the payment is postmarked.
- 3.6 **Disputed Payment Procedures** – In the event of a disputed or contested billing by City, only that portion so contested may be withheld from payment, and the undisputed portion will be paid. City shall notify Consultant of a disputed invoice, or portion of an invoice, in writing by the twenty-first (21st) calendar day after the date City receives the invoice. City shall provide Consultant an opportunity to cure the basis of the dispute. If a dispute is resolved in favor of Consultant, City shall proceed to process said invoice, or the disputed portion of the invoice, within the provisions of **Article 3.5** of this Agreement. If a dispute is resolved in favor of City, Consultant shall submit to City a corrected invoice, reflecting any and all payment(s) of the undisputed amounts, documenting the credited amounts, and identifying outstanding amounts on said invoice to aid City in processing payment for the remaining balance. Such revised invoice shall have a new invoice number, clearly referencing the previous submitted invoice. City agrees to exercise reasonableness in contesting any billing or portion thereof that has background materials supporting the submitted charges.
- 3.7 **Failure to Pay** – Failure of City to pay an invoice, for a reason other than on written notification as stated in the provisions of **Article 3.6** of this Agreement, to Consultant within sixty (60) days from the date of the invoice shall grant Consultant the right, in addition to any and all other rights provided, to, upon written notice to City, suspend performance under this Agreement, and such act or acts shall not be deemed a breach of this Agreement. However, Consultant shall not suspend performance under this Agreement prior to the tenth (10th) calendar day after written notice of suspension was provided to City, in accordance with Chapter 2251, Subchapter “D” of the TEX. GOV’T CODE. City shall not be required to pay any invoice submitted by Consultant if Consultant breached any provision(s) herein.

- 3.8 **Adjusted Compensation** – If the Scope of the Project (“Scope of the Project”) or if the Services are materially changed due to no error by Consultant in the performance of Services under this Agreement, the amounts of Consultant’s compensation shall be equitably adjusted as approved by City. Any additional amounts paid to Consultant as a result of any material change to the Scope of the Project shall be authorized by written Change Order duly executed by both parties before the Services are performed.
- 3.9 **Project Suspension** – If the Project is suspended or abandoned in whole or in part for more than three (3) months, Consultant shall be entitled to compensation for any and all work completed to the satisfaction of City in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement prior to suspension or abandonment. In the event of such suspension or abandonment, Consultant shall deliver to City all finished or unfinished documents, data, studies, drawings, maps, models, reports, photographs and/or any other items prepared by Consultant in connection with this Agreement prior to Consultant receiving final payment. If the Project is resumed after being suspended for more than three (3) months, Consultant’s compensation shall be equitably adjusted as approved by City. Any additional amounts paid to Consultant after the Project is resumed shall be agreed upon in writing by both parties before the services are performed.

ARTICLE 4 OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS

- 4.1 **Documents Property of City** – The Project is the property of City, and Consultant may not use the documents, plans, data, studies, surveys, drawings, maps, models, reports, photographs and/or any materials for any other purpose not relating to the Project without City’s prior written consent. City shall be furnished with such reproductions of the Project, plans, data, documents, maps, and any other information as defined in **Exhibit A**. Upon completion of the work, or any earlier termination of this Agreement under Article 3 and/or Article 8 of this Agreement, Consultant will revise plans, data, documents, maps, and any other information as defined in **Exhibit A** to reflect changes while working on the Project through the date of completion of the work, as solely determined by City, or the effective date of any earlier termination of this Agreement under Article 3 and/or Article 8 of this Agreement, and promptly furnish the same to City in an acceptable electronic format. All such reproductions shall be the property of City who may use them without Consultant’s permission for any purpose relating to the Project, including, but not limited to, completion of the Project, and/or additions, alterations, modifications, and/or revisions to the Project. Any reuse of the documents not relating to the Project shall be at City’s own risk.
- 4.2 **Documents Subject to Laws Regarding Public Disclosure** – Consultant acknowledges that City is a governmental entity and that all documents, plans,

data, studies, surveys, drawings, maps, models, reports, photographs and/or any items prepared or furnished by Consultant (and Consultant's professional associates and/or sub-consultants) under this Agreement are instruments of service in respect of the Project and property of City. Upon completion of the Project, all of the documents, plans, data, studies, surveys, drawings, maps, models, reports, photographs and/or any items prepared or furnished by Consultant (and Consultant's professional associates and/or sub-consultants) shall thereafter be subject to the Texas Public Information Act (Chapter 552, TEX. GOV'T CODE, as amended) and any other applicable laws requiring public disclosure of the information contained in said documents.

ARTICLE 5 CONSULTANT'S INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

- 5.1 **Required General Liability Insurance** – Consistent with the terms and provisions of **Exhibit E**, Contractor Insurance Guidelines, which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference for all purposes, Consultant shall procure and maintain throughout the term of this Agreement, at no expense to City, a general liability insurance policy with a company that maintains a minimum rating of “A” by A.M. Best's Key Rating Guide, or other equivalent rating service(s), and is authorized to transact business in the State of Texas, in an amount not less than One Million and 00/100 Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) for each occurrence, and Two Million and 00/100 Dollars (\$2,000,000.00) in the aggregate. Such policy shall name City, its officers, agents, representatives, and employees as additional insureds as to all applicable coverage. Such policy shall provide for a waiver of subrogation against City for injuries, including death, property damage, or any other loss to the extent that same is covered by the proceeds of the insurance. Such policy shall require the provision of written notice to City at least thirty (30) days prior to cancellation, non-renewal or material modification of any policies, evidenced by return receipt or United States Certified Mail. Consultant shall furnish City with certificates and required endorsement(s) evidencing such coverage prior to commencing work on the Project.
- 5.2 **Required Professional Liability Insurance** – Consistent with the terms and provisions of **Exhibit E**, Consultant shall procure and maintain throughout the term of this Agreement, at no expense to City, a professional liability (errors and omissions) insurance policy with a company that maintains a minimum rating of “A” by A.M. Best's Key Rating Guide, or other equivalent rating service(s), and is authorized to transact business in the State of Texas, in an amount not less than One Million and 00/100 Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) for each claim, and Two Million and 00/100 Dollars (\$2,000,000.00) in the aggregate. Such policy shall require the provision of written notice to City at least thirty (30) days prior to cancellation, non-renewal or material modification of any policies, evidenced by return receipt or United States Certified Mail. Consultant shall furnish City with certificates and

required endorsement(s) evidencing such coverage prior to commencing work on the Project.

5.3 **Required Workers Compensation Insurance** – Consistent with the terms and provisions of **Exhibit E**, Consultant shall procure and maintain throughout the term of this Agreement, at no expense to City, all Statutory Workers Compensation Insurance as required by the laws of the State of Texas. Such insurance policy shall be with a company that maintains a minimum rating of “A” by A.M. Best’s Key Rating Guide, or other equivalent service(s), and is authorized to transact business in the State of Texas. Such policy shall require the provision of written notice to City at least thirty (30) days prior to cancellation, non-renewal or material modification of any policies, evidenced by return receipt or United States Certified Mail. Consultant shall furnish City with certificates and required endorsement(s) evidencing such coverage prior to commencing work on the Project.

5.4 **Circumstances Requiring Umbrella Coverage or Excess Liability Coverage** – If the Project’s size and scope warrant, and if identified on the checklist located in **Exhibit E**, Consultant shall procure and maintain throughout the term of this Agreement, at no expense to City, an umbrella coverage or excess liability coverage insurance policy with a company that maintains a minimum rating of “A” by A.M. Best’s Key Rating Guide, or other equivalent rating service(s), and is authorized to transact business in the State of Texas, in an amount of Two Million and 00/100 Dollars (\$2,000,000.00). Such policy shall require the provision of written notice to City at least thirty (30) days prior to cancellation, non-renewal, or material modification of any policies, evidenced by return receipt or United States Certified Mail. Consultant shall furnish City with certificates and required endorsement(s) evidencing such coverage prior to commencing work on the Project.

ARTICLE 6 CONSULTANT’S ACCOUNTING RECORDS

Records of Direct Expenses and expenses pertaining to services performed in conjunction with the Project shall be kept on the basis of generally accepted accounting principles. Invoices will be sent to City as indicated in Article 3.4 of this Agreement. Copies of employee time sheets, receipts for direct expense items and other records of Project expenses will be included in the monthly invoices.

ARTICLE 7 AUDITS AND RECORDS/PROHIBITED INTEREST/VENDOR DISCLOSURE

Consultant agrees that at any time during normal business hours and as often as City may deem necessary, Consultant shall make available to representatives of City for examination all of its records with respect to all matters covered by this Agreement, and will permit such representatives of City to audit, examine, copy and make excerpts or

transcripts from such records, and to make audits of all contracts, invoices, materials, payrolls, records of personnel, conditions of employment and other data relating to all matters covered by this Agreement, and for a period of four (4) years from the date of final settlement of this Agreement or for such other or longer period, if any, as may be required by applicable statute or other lawful requirement.

Consultant agrees that it is aware of the prohibited interest requirement of the City Charter and will abide by the same. Further, a lawful representative of Consultant shall execute the Prohibited Interest Affidavit, attached hereto as **Exhibit F** and incorporated herein by reference for all purposes, no later than the Effective Date of this Agreement. Consultant understands and agrees that the existence of a prohibited interest during the term of this Agreement will render the Agreement voidable.

Consultant agrees that it is further aware of the vendor disclosure requirements set forth in Chapter 176, TEX. LOC. GOV'T CODE, as amended, and will abide by the same. In this connection, a lawful representative of Consultant shall execute and deliver to City the Form 1295 Certificate of Interested Parties, attached hereto as **Exhibit G** and incorporated herein for all purposes, and the Conflict of Interest Questionnaire, Form CIQ, attached hereto as **Exhibit H** and incorporated herein for all purposes, no later than the Effective Date of this Agreement.

ARTICLE 8 TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT/REMEDIES

City may, upon thirty (30) days written notice to Consultant, terminate this Agreement, for any reason or no reason at all, before the termination date hereof, without prejudice to any other remedy it may have. If City terminates this Agreement due to a default of and/or breach by Consultant and the expense of finishing the Project exceeds Consultant's Fee at the time of termination, Consultant waives its right to any portion of Consultant's Fee as set forth in Article 3 of this Agreement and agrees to pay any costs over and above the fee which City is required to pay in order to finish the Project. On any default and/or breach by Consultant, City may elect not to terminate the Agreement, and in such event it may make good the deficiency in which the default consists, and deduct the costs from Consultant's Fee due Consultant as set forth in Article 3 of this Agreement. If City terminates this Agreement and Consultant is not in default of the Agreement, Consultant shall be entitled to compensation for any and all work completed to the satisfaction of City in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement prior to termination.

In the event of any termination, Consultant shall deliver to City all finished and/or unfinished documents, data, studies, surveys, drawings, maps, models, reports, photographs and/or any items prepared by Consultant in connection with this Agreement prior to Consultant receiving final payment.

The rights and remedies provided by this Agreement are cumulative, and the use of any one right or remedy by either party shall not preclude or waive its rights to use any or all other remedies. These rights and remedies are given in addition to any other rights the parties may have by law, statute, ordinance, or otherwise.

ARTICLE 9 DISPUTE RESOLUTION/MEDIATION

In addition to all remedies at law, the parties may agree to attempt to resolve any controversy, claim or dispute arising out of or relating to the interpretation or performance of this Agreement, or breach thereof, by voluntary mediation to be conducted by a mutually acceptable mediator. However, if both parties do not agree to voluntarily mediate any such controversy, claim or dispute, mediation shall not be required.

ARTICLE 10 INDEMNITY

CONSULTANT SHALL INDEMNIFY AND HOLD HARMLESS CITY AND ITS CITY COUNCIL MEMBERS, OFFICERS, AGENTS, REPRESENTATIVES AND EMPLOYEES (COLLECTIVELY REFERRED TO AS “CITY” FOR PURPOSES OF THIS ARTICLE 10) FROM AND AGAINST DAMAGES, INJURIES (WHETHER IN CONTRACT OR IN TORT, INCLUDING PERSONAL INJURY AND DEATH), CLAIMS, PROPERTY DAMAGES (INCLUDING LOSS OF USE), LOSSES, DEMANDS, SUITS, ACTIONS, JUDGMENTS, LIENS, COSTS AND EXPENSES, INCLUDING REIMBURSEMENT OF REASONABLE ATTORNEY’S FEES IN PROPORTION TO CONSULTANT’S LIABILITY (INCLUDING ATTORNEY’S FEES AND EXPENSES INCURRED IN ENFORCING THIS ARTICLE 10), THAT IN WHOLE OR IN PART ARISE OUT OF OR ARE CONNECTED WITH, OR THAT ARE ALLEGED TO HAVE ARISEN OUT OF OR CONNECTED WITH, GOODS AND/OR SERVICES PROVIDED BY CONSULTANT, ITS OFFICERS, AGENTS, REPRESENTATIVES, EMPLOYEES, SUBCONTRACTORS, LICENSEES, INVITEES OR ANY OTHER THIRD PARTIES FOR WHOM CONSULTANT IS LEGALLY RESPONSIBLE (COLLECTIVELY REFERRED TO AS “CONSULTANT” FOR PURPOSES OF THIS ARTICLE 10) TO THE EXTENT RESULTING FROM THE NEGLIGENT, GROSSLY NEGLIGENT AND/OR INTENTIONAL WRONGFUL ACT AND/OR OMISSION OF CONSULTANT IN ITS/THEIR PERFORMANCE OF THIS AGREEMENT (COLLECTIVELY, “CLAIMS”). THIS INDEMNIFICATION PROVISION AND THE USE OF THE TERM “CLAIMS” IS ALSO SPECIFICALLY INTENDED TO APPLY TO, BUT IS NOT LIMITED TO CLAIMS, WHETHER CIVIL OR CRIMINAL, BROUGHT AGAINST CITY BY ANY GOVERNMENT AUTHORITY OR AGENCY RELATED TO ANY PERSON PROVIDING SERVICES UNDER THIS AGREEMENT

THAT ARE BASED ON ANY FEDERAL IMMIGRATION LAW AND CLAIMS, DEMANDS, DAMAGES, ACTIONS AND CAUSES OF ACTION OF EVERY KIND AND NATURE, KNOWN AND UNKNOWN, EXISTING OR CLAIMED TO EXIST, RELATING TO OR ARISING OUT OF ANY EMPLOYMENT RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN CONSULTANT AND ITS EMPLOYEES OR SUBCONTRACTORS AS A RESULT OF THAT SUBCONTRACTOR'S OR EMPLOYEE'S EMPLOYMENT AND/OR SEPARATION FROM EMPLOYMENT WITH THE CONSULTANT, INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO ANY DISCRIMINATION CLAIM BASED ON SEX, SEXUAL ORIENTATION OR PREFERENCE, RACE, RELIGION, COLOR, NATIONAL ORIGIN, AGE OR DISABILITY UNDER FEDERAL, STATE OR LOCAL LAW, RULE OR REGULATION, AND/OR ANY CLAIM FOR WRONGFUL TERMINATION, BACK PAY, FUTURE WAGE LOSS, OVERTIME PAY, EMPLOYEE BENEFITS, INJURY SUBJECT TO RELIEF UNDER THE WORKERS' COMPENSATION ACT OR WOULD BE SUBJECT TO RELIEF UNDER ANY POLICY FOR WORKERS COMPENSATION INSURANCE, AND ANY OTHER CLAIM, WHETHER IN TORT, CONTRACT OR OTHERWISE. EXCEPT TO THE EXTENT NOT REQUIRED BY APPLICABLE LAW CONSULTANT IS EXPRESSLY REQUIRED TO DEFEND CITY AGAINST ALL SUCH FEDERAL IMMIGRATION CLAIMS; PROVIDED, HOWEVER, THAT IF A COURT OF COMPETENT JURISDICTION SIGNS A JUDGMENT THAT BECOMES FINAL AND NON-APPEALABLE, DETERMINING THAT THE CITY (WITHOUT WAIVING ANY GOVERNMENTAL IMMUNITY) HAS JOINT, CONCURRENT OR SOLE NEGLIGENCE FOR THE CLAIMS IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE LAWS OF THE STATE OF TEXAS ("JUDGMENT"), THEN CONSULTANT IS NOT REQUIRED TO INDEMNIFY OR DEFEND CITY TO THE EXTENT OF THE NEGLIGENCE APPORTIONED TO CITY FOR EACH CAUSE(S) OF ACTION IDENTIFIED IN THE JUDGMENT. IN THE EVENT THE JUDGMENT PROVIDES THAT CITY IS JOINTLY, CONCURRENTLY OR SOLELY NEGLIGENT FOR THE CLAIMS REFERRED TO THEREIN, CITY AGREES TO REIMBURSE CONSULTANT FOR ALL REASONABLE AND NECESSARY COSTS INCURRED AND PAID BY CONSULTANT THAT ARE ATTRIBUTABLE TO CITY'S PERCENTAGE OF JOINT, CONCURRENT OR SOLE NEGLIGENCE, AS SET FORTH IN THE JUDGMENT, INCLUDING REASONABLE AND NECESSARY ATTORNEY'S FEES AND EXPENSES, WITHIN SIXTY (60) DAYS OF THE DATE THE JUDGMENT BECOMES FINAL AND NON-APPEALABLE. IF THIS AGREEMENT IS A CONTRACT FOR ENGINEERING OR ARCHITECTURAL SERVICES, THEN CONSULTANT'S INDEMNITY AND DEFENSE OBLIGATIONS UNDER THIS ARTICLE 10 ARE LIMITED BY, AND TO BE AMENDED TO COMPLY WITH, SECTION 271.904 OF THE TEXAS LOCAL GOVERNMENT CODE.

TO THE EXTENT REQUIRED BY APPLICABLE LAW CITY SHALL HAVE THE RIGHT TO APPROVE OR SELECT DEFENSE COUNSEL TO BE RETAINED BY CONSULTANT IN FULFILLING ITS OBLIGATION HEREUNDER TO DEFEND AND INDEMNIFY CITY, UNLESS SUCH RIGHT IS EXPRESSLY WAIVED BY CITY IN WRITING. CITY RESERVES THE RIGHT TO PROVIDE A PORTION OR ALL OF ITS OWN DEFENSE; HOWEVER, CITY IS UNDER NO OBLIGATION TO DO SO. ANY SUCH ACTION BY CITY IS NOT TO BE CONSTRUED AS A WAIVER OF CONSULTANT'S OBLIGATION TO DEFEND CITY OR AS A WAIVER OF CONSULTANT'S OBLIGATION TO INDEMNIFY CITY PURSUANT TO THIS AGREEMENT. CONSULTANT SHALL RETAIN CITY-APPROVED DEFENSE COUNSEL WITHIN SEVEN (7) BUSINESS DAYS OF CITY'S WRITTEN NOTICE THAT CITY IS INVOKING ITS RIGHT TO DEFENSE OR INDEMNIFICATION UNDER THIS AGREEMENT. IF CONSULTANT FAILS TO RETAIN COUNSEL WITHIN SUCH TIME PERIOD, CITY SHALL HAVE THE RIGHT TO RETAIN DEFENSE COUNSEL ON ITS OWN BEHALF, AND CONSULTANT SHALL BE LIABLE FOR ALL COSTS INCURRED BY CITY. THE RIGHTS AND OBLIGATIONS CREATED BY THIS ARTICLE SHALL SURVIVE TERMINATION OF THIS AGREEMENT.

ARTICLE 11 NOTICES

Any notice provided or permitted to be given under this Agreement must be in writing and may be served by depositing the same in the United States Mail, addressed to the party to be notified, postage pre-paid and registered or certified with return receipt requested; by facsimile; by electronic mail, with documentation evidencing the addressee's receipt thereof; or by delivering the same in person to such party a via hand-delivery service, or any courier service that provides a return receipt showing the date of actual delivery of same to the addressee thereof. Notice given in accordance herewith shall be effective upon receipt at the address of the addressee. For purposes of notification, the addresses of the parties shall be as follows:

ARTICLE 12 MISCELLANEOUS

12.1 **Complete Agreement** – This Agreement, including the exhibits hereto labeled “A” through “H,” all of which are incorporated herein for all purposes, constitute the entire Agreement by and between the parties regarding the subject matter hereof and supersedes all prior and/or contemporaneous written and/or oral understandings. This Agreement may not be amended, supplemented, and/or modified except by written agreement duly executed by both parties. To the extent that **Exhibit A**, **Exhibit B**, **Exhibit C**, **Exhibit D**, **Exhibit E**, **Exhibit F**, **Exhibit G** or **Exhibit H** are in conflict with provisions of this Agreement or each other, the provisions of this Agreement, then the provisions of **Exhibit B**, **Exhibit C**, **Exhibit D**, **Exhibit E**, **Exhibit F**, **Exhibit G**, **Exhibit H** or **Exhibit A** shall prevail in that order.

- 12.2 **Assignment and Subletting** – Consultant agrees that neither this Agreement nor the work to be performed hereunder will be assigned or sublet without the prior written consent of City. Consultant further agrees that the assignment or subletting of any portion or feature of the work or materials required in the performance of this Agreement shall not relieve Consultant of its full obligations to City as provided by this Agreement. All such approved work performed by assignment or subletting shall be billed through Consultant, and there shall be no third party billing.
- 12.3 **Attorney's Fees** – If either party files any action or brings any proceeding against the other arising from this Agreement, then as between City and Consultant, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover as an element of its costs of suit, and not as damages, reasonable attorney's fees and litigation expenses both at trial and on appeal, subject to the limitations set forth in TEX. LOC. GOV'T CODE § 271.153, as it exists or may be amended, if applicable.
- 12.4 **Successors and Assigns** – City and Consultant, and their respective partners, assigns, successors, subcontractors, executors, officers, agents, employees, representatives and administrators are hereby bound to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
- 12.5 **Savings/Severability** – In the event of a term, condition, or provision of this Agreement is determined to be invalid, illegal, void, unenforceable, or unlawful by a court of competent jurisdiction, then that term, condition, or provision, shall be deleted and the remainder of the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect as if such invalid, illegal, void, unenforceable or unlawful provision had never been contained in this Agreement.
- 12.6 **Governing Law/Venue** – This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas, without regard to conflict of law principles. The exclusive venue for any action arising out of this Agreement shall be a court of appropriate jurisdiction in Collin County, Texas.
- 12.7 **Execution/Consideration** – This Agreement is executed by the parties hereto without coercion or duress for any substantial consideration, the sufficiency of which is forever confessed.
- 12.8 **Authority** – The individuals executing this Agreement on behalf of the respective parties below represent to each other that all appropriate and necessary action has been taken to authorize the individual who is executing this Agreement to do so for and on behalf of the party for which his or her signature appears, that there are no other parties or entities required to execute this Agreement in order for the same to be an authorized and binding agreement on the other party for whom the individual is signing this Agreement and that each individual affixing his or her signature hereto is authorized to do so, and such authorization is valid and effective on the date hereof.

- 12.9 **Waiver** – Waiver by either party of any breach of this Agreement, or the failure of either party to enforce any of the provisions of this Agreement, at any time, shall not in any way affect, limit, or waive such party's right thereafter to enforce and compel strict compliance.
- 12.10 **Headings** – The headings of the various sections of this Agreement are included solely for convenience of reference and are not to be full or accurate descriptions of the content thereof.
- 12.11 **Multiple Counterparts** – This Agreement may be executed in a number of identical counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original for all purposes. An electronic mail and/or facsimile signature will also be deemed to constitute an original if properly executed and delivered to the other party.
- 12.12 **Immunity** – It is expressly understood and agreed that, in the execution and performance of this Agreement, City has not waived, nor shall be deemed to have waived, any immunity, governmental, sovereign and/or official, or defense that is available to it against claims arising in the exercise of governmental powers and functions. By entering into this Agreement, the parties do not create any obligations, express or implied, other than those set forth in this Agreement.
- 12.13 **Incorporation of Recitals** – The representations, covenants and recitations set forth in the foregoing recitals of this Agreement are true and correct and are incorporated into the body of this Agreement and adopted as findings of City and the authorized representative of Consultant.
- 12.14 **Additional Representations** – Each signatory represents this Agreement has been read by the party for which this Agreement is executed and that such party has had the opportunity to confer with its counsel.
- 12.15 **Miscellaneous Drafting Provisions** – This Agreement shall be deemed drafted equally by all parties hereto. The language of all parts of this Agreement shall be construed as a whole according to its fair meaning, and any presumption or principle that the language herein is to be construed against any party shall not apply.
- 12.16 **No Third Party Beneficiaries** – Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to create any right in any third party not a signatory to this Agreement, and the parties do not intend to create any third party beneficiaries by entering into this Agreement.
- 12.17 **Indemnity** – The parties agree that the Indemnity provision set forth in Article 10 of this Agreement is conspicuous and the parties have read and understood the same.

- 12.18 **Representations** – All representations and covenants made by one party to the other in this Agreement or in any certificate or other instrument delivered by one party to the other under this Agreement shall be considered to have been relied upon by the other party and will survive the satisfaction of any fees under this Agreement, regardless of any investigation made by either party.
- 12.19 **Independent Contractor** – In performing this Agreement, Consultant shall act as an independent contractor with respect to City. In no event shall this Agreement be construed as establishing a partnership, joint venture or similar relationship between the parties and nothing herein shall authorize either party to act as agent for the other. Consultant shall be liable for its own debts, obligations, acts and omissions, including the payment of all required withholding, social security and other taxes and benefits with respect to all of Consultant’s officers, directors, partners, employees and representatives, who shall not be considered City employees and shall not be eligible for any employee benefit plan offered by City.
- 12.20 **Debarment/Suspension** – City is prohibited from making any award or permitting any award at any tier to any party which is debarred or suspended or otherwise excluded from or ineligible for participation in federal assistance programs under Executive Order 12549, Debarment and Suspension. City, Consultant and Consultant’s subcontractors shall comply with federal and state regulations regarding debarment and suspension. Consultant shall include a statement of compliance with federal and state debarment and suspension regulations in all third-party agreements for work on the Project.
- 12.21 **Restrictions on Lobbying** – City and Consultant are prohibited from using funds awarded under the Agreement for lobbying purposes. Consultant shall include a statement of compliance with this provision in applicable procurement solicitations and third-Party agreements for work on the Project.
- 12.22 **Appropriation of Funds** – Funds are not presently budgeted for City’s performance under this Agreement beyond the end of City’s 2019-2020 fiscal year. City will give Consultant sixty (60) days’ notice if funds for City’s performance are not budgeted to continue beyond that time. City shall have no liability for payment of any money for services performed after the end of City’s 2019-2020 fiscal year unless and until such funds are budgeted.
- 12.23 **Reference to Consultant** – When referring to “Consultant,” this Agreement shall refer to and be binding upon Consultant, and its officers, directors, partners, employees, representatives, contractors, subcontractors, licensees, invitees, agents, successors, assignees (as authorized herein), vendors, grantees, trustees, legal representatives and/or any other third parties for whom Consultant is legally responsible.

12.24 **Reference to City** – When referring to “City,” this Agreement shall refer to and be binding upon City, its Council members, officers, agents, representatives, employees and/or any other authorized third parties for whom City is legally responsible.

EXHIBIT A SCOPE OF SERVICES

This scope of services is for *Subsurface Utility Engineering and Engineering Design Services* by Halff Associates Inc. (HAI) for the City of Bedford, TX (the CITY).

I. PURPOSE

The purpose of the services proposed herein is to provide professional consulting services consisting of but not limited to subsurface utility engineering, civil engineering, procurement, and construction phase services to replace water and sanitary sewer lines within the existing West Pipeline Road right-of-way between Arwine Cemetery Road and Raider Drive in advance of the City of Euless project to reconstruct W. Pipeline Road. Additionally, minor sidewalk extensions, accessible ramp replacements and minor traffic signal modifications at Forest Ridge Dr. will be designed.

II. ASSUMPTIONS

- Design surveys were performed for the reconstruction of W. Pipeline Road for the City of Euless in a separate contract. These design surveys are adequate for the reconstruction of City of Bedford utilities located within the W. Pipeline Road right-of-way. Therefore, no design surveys, other than what is necessary for SUE services, are included in this scope of work.
- New sidewalks along the north side of W. Pipeline Rd. will be provided between Gettysburg Pl. and Raider Dr. No additional sidewalks other than replacing curb ramps are to be designed.
- A new, continuous 8-inch water line will be designed from 20 feet west of Arwine Cemetery Rd. east to Raider Dr. Profiles will be provided at the Sulphur Branch crossing and the culvert crossing near the Westdale Hills Community. The remaining sections of water line do not require profiles.
- All sanitary sewer lines and manholes will be replaced. Installation by the pipe bursting method will be evaluated.
- Only necessary modifications to make the Forest Ridge Dr. traffic signal comply with ADA regulations will be made. Additionally, all conduit, wiring and ground boxes will be replaced.
- Submittals will meet SWIFT funding requirements and coordination with the Texas Water Development Board is included.

III. SCOPE

Halff Associates, Inc. will perform the following services:

- I. **Surveying (Not included in this contract, but performed under separate contract with the City of Euless).** The Consultant shall provide surveying services, which, in general, may be defined as normal services applicable to a project of this type. The following particulars will also apply:

1. Vertical benchmarks shall be established such that all points of construction shall be within 300 feet of a benchmark. Benchmarks should not be subject to loss during construction. Fire hydrants and similar appurtenances are not to be used for benchmarks. The best available City and/or TxDOT survey control and benchmarks will be used, and the Consultant shall establish temporary benchmarks throughout the length of the project.
 2. Topographic features will be surveyed along with other features needed for design, review, permitting, construction and inspection of the project. Coverage will extend the full width of the West Pipeline Road right-of-way and beyond far enough to integrate the design with the adjacent property features, including driveways and walkways. All trees located in or near public road rights-of-way will be tied and the size, species and condition noted.
 3. Existing property corners, iron pins, etc. shall be tied into established, existing rights-of-way. Prior to surveying on private property, the surveyor shall obtain written right-of-entry from the property owners and/or tenants. If permission cannot be obtained, the City will assist, or other arrangements worked out.
 4. Halff will contact Texas 811 to mark utilities in the right-of-way. The designating work such as paint marks, pin flags, and all above ground utility appurtenances will be surveyed and tied to the project survey control as part of the Design Scope.
 5. The City of Bedford will provide available record drawings for City water, wastewater, storm drain, and roadway. Halff will incorporate this data into the survey base file.
- II. Subsurface Utility Engineering.** The Consultant will perform SUE in accordance with ASCE CI/ASCE 38-02 "Standard Guideline for the Collection and Depiction of Existing Subsurface Utility Data." This standard defines the following Quality Levels:
- Quality Level-A: Precise horizontal and vertical location of utilities obtained by the actual exposure (or verification of previously exposed and surveyed utilities) and subsequent measurement of subsurface utilities, usually at a specific point. Minimally intrusive excavation equipment is typically used to minimize the potential for utility damage. A precise horizontal and vertical location, as well as other utility attributes, is shown on plan documents.
 - Quality Level-B: Information obtained through the application of appropriate surface geophysical methods to determine the existence and approximate horizontal position of subsurface utilities. Quality Level-B data should be reproducible by surface geophysics at any point of their depiction. This

information is surveyed to applicable tolerances defined by the project and reduced onto plan documents.

- Quality Level-C: Information obtained by surveying and plotting visible above-ground utility features and by using professional judgment in correlating this information to Quality Level-D information.
 - Quality Level-D: Information derived from existing records or oral recollections.
1. Quality Level-A Utility Test Holes (Vacuum Excavation): Up to ten (10) test holes will be performed on various utilities at locations approved by the City. The Consultant will cut up to a 12” square test hole, excavate down to utility, record the depth to top of utility, backfill & compact the hole, and restore the surface to its original condition. An iron rod with cap or “x-cut” will be set to mark the approximate centerline location of the utility. A jackhammer will be utilized for work to be performed in asphalt and concrete areas. This Scope of Services includes all test holes being performed under one (1) mobilization.
 2. Quality Level-B Utility Designating: The Consultant will designate the approximate horizontal position of conductive/toneable utilities within the project limits using geophysical prospecting equipment and mark using paint and/or pin flags. We anticipate the designation of approximately 48,000 linear feet of utilities including buried communication, electric, natural gas, petroleum pipeline, water, wastewater/sanitary sewer, and storm drain/storm sewer. Designation of irrigation lines, HDPE lines, gathering lines, asbestos concrete and/or pvc lines, as well as pvc lines without tracer wire or access are not part of this Scope of Services.
 3. Because of limited utility record information and the possibility of non-conductive/un-toneable utilities, The Consultant cannot guarantee all utilities will be found and marked within the project limits.
 4. Quality Level-C Surveying: Quality Level-B Utility Designation paint markings, pin flags, and above ground utility appurtenances as well the iron rod with cap or “x-cut” for Quality Level-A Test Holes will be surveyed and tied utilizing project survey control provided by City.
 5. Quality Level-D Records Research: Available Records will be provided to the Consultant by the City. The Consultant will perform additional utility record research as needed to successfully complete the project.
 6. Because there are situations where the utility does not have a metallic composition, a metallic tracer line attached, or access to insert a tracer line, the

approximate location of the utility may be determined by the use of utility records and direct correspondence with the utility owner/representative. In these areas, the information will be considered Quality Level-D, depicted according to utility record information only.

7. SUE Field Manager / Professional Engineer: A SUE Field Manager will be on-site for a portion of this project for field crew supervision, field quality control, and coordination with on-site personnel. A Professional Engineer will be responsible for QA/QC, management of the contract, coordination with the project team and signing the final deliverables if required.
8. SUE Deliverables: Deliverables for the Quality Level-A Test Hole excavations will be an 8.5-in. x 11-in. Test Hole Data Form for each Test Hole performed indicating depth, size, location, and other notable characteristics of the utility.
9. Permitting: Street Cut permits will be coordinated with the City as required.
10. Right-of-Entry: Right-of-Entry is not part of this Scope of Services as work is anticipated within the existing road right-of-way. If right-of-entry is required, it will be performed and provided to Consultant by City. The Consultant will coordinate with property owner(s) once right-of-entry has been obtained.
11. Work Zone Traffic Control: The Consultant will provide standard temporary work zone traffic control consisting of cones and free-standing signage for this project. This Scope of Services does not include lane closure(s), flag person(s), changeable message board(s), arrow board(s) and/or engineered traffic control plans. If an engineered traffic control plan is required for permit approval or if unique traffic control conditions exist, The Consultant will notify City of Bedford and submit a supplemental agreement for authorization prior to proceeding with additional work.

III. Construction Plans. The Consultant shall develop construction plans for review, permitting, bidding, construction, inspection and record keeping. In general, construction plans shall be consistent with normal practice for projects of this nature. The following particulars will also apply. The construction plans will consist of numerous sheets ordered as follows:

1. Title Sheet – (Sheet No. 1). The title sheet shall include a location map drawn to a scale of 1" = 1000', approximately ten inches square. It shall also include a sheet index with drawings numbered consecutively and without subscripts. Additionally, the title sheet shall show the project name "**West Pipeline Road Water and Sanitary Sewer Line Replacements between Arwine Cemetery Road and Raider Drive**", project number, date, City logo, Consultant's name, address, and telephone number and other items as may be specified.

2. Project Layout Sheet(s). The project layout sheet(s) shall be drawn to a scale of 1" = 200' and laid out with the north arrow pointed up on the sheet. The purpose of the project layout is to depict the project in a simplified view. Major items of work shall be shown without excessive detail. This sheet will also show the existing water and wastewater systems with valves, hydrants, and manholes. This sheet(s) may include a listing of abbreviations, legend, general notes, and key map.
3. Typical Sections. Typical sections shall be drawn to scales of 1" = 5' h and 1" = 2' v and shall depict a view looking north or east. As a minimum, typical sections are to be drawn showing the relationship of the proposed water and sanitary sewer lines to existing road improvements. Typical sections should include existing roadways, utilities, right-of-way lines, etc., along with all proposed improvements and should depict all significant items of work. Each section should extend beyond the easement and rights-of-way a distance to clearly show the relationship between the proposed improvements and the existing properties. Typical sections shall be prepared at critical areas and be sufficient in number to show varying conditions for each water and sanitary sewer line segment.
4. Plan and Profile Sheets. Plan-profile sheets shall be arranged from south to north and from west to east, with the north arrow up or to the right on the sheet. Plan-profile sheets shall be drawn to scales of 1" = 20' h and 1" = 4' v. Stationing shall be from west to east with the beginning station being set the connection point near Arwine Cemetery Road. Each plan-profile sheet should include no more than 500 feet of improvement; thus, leaving ample margins both left and right. The plan and profile station should align vertically on the sheet with the proposed centerline drawn parallel to the profile grid. When there is a centerline curvature, the plan-profile should be drawn so that as much of the plan view is in alignment as possible. Plan-profile sheets shall depict all existing and proposed items pertinent to the project.
5. Detail Sheets. The City's standard drawings may be used as a beginning point in developing standard details for this project. They will not be simply copied but shall be reviewed and modified for this project. Where other agency standards are used, they shall be reduced as necessary to fit on the City's standard sheet format with complete title block.
6. Miscellaneous. Construction plans also need to address water and sanitary sewer line connection details. **Erosion control, general construction sequencing and traffic control are specifically excluded from this scope of work and will be the responsibility of the Contractor to develop these**

documents for City review and approval. These items will be addressed in the projects contract specifications.

7. Review Plans. – The Consultant shall develop plans and profiles and estimates of probable cost at the 30% milestone for review and comment to determine the feasibility of the project and to confirm constructability and cost before developing preliminary plans. The Consultant and City shall meet after the 30% milestone to review the project and address City comments. Final plans shall be prepared and submitted at the 90% and 100% milestones. Also, the Consultant may submit plan sheets or working drawings to the City for review and comment to reduce the number of revisions that otherwise would be required. During development of the plans, the Consultant shall attend meetings as needed. The Consultant shall, in company with the City, perform at least two plans-in-hand reviews during the 30% and 90% design phases.
8. Design. – The design of the project shall be in general accordance with the City of Bedford Subdivision Ordinance, TCEQ requirements, TWDB requirements and good engineering practices.
9. Utility Coordination. - During the design phase, the Consultant shall contact various utility companies and obtain information relating to existing utility lines. The design should avoid major utility relocations, where practical. Where they are required, proposed relocations or replacements will be shown in plan and profile.
10. Prints. – The Consultant shall provide prints of construction plans for review and permitting. Two (2) sets of plans will be submitted to the City for each review stage. The Consultant will provide utility companies with copies of plans for review. The City will provide prints for bidding and construction.
11. General. – Construction plans shall be developed on electronic files compatible with the City’s CADD system. Construction plans shall also be furnished on 22” x 34” sheets. The City’s standard format shall be used. All review prints shall be furnished on 22” x 34” sheets. Construction plans shall be suitable for half-scale reduction and shall be provided as follows: one set of 11” x 17” paper originals drawn by laser plotter.
12. Specifications. – The Consultant shall prepare technical specifications required for bidding and constructing the project. Only specifications amending or supplementing COG specifications need be furnished. Under this section, the Consultant shall also provide a listing of bid items with quantities and construction cost estimates. Specifications, bid items and quantities shall be furnished on hard copy and by electronic file in Microsoft Word and PDF formats.

13. Coordination with Texas Water Development Board (TWDB). – Submittals will meet SWIFT funding requirements and coordination with the TWDB is included.

IV. Bidding, Construction, Closure.

1. Bidding – During the bidding phase, the Consultant will assist the City by addressing technical questions and preparing draft addenda for issuance by the City. The Consultant will attend the pre-bid meeting.
2. Construction –The Consultant’s design engineer and/or project manager shall attend the pre-construction meeting. The Consultant shall assist the City in the preparation of field changes and/or change orders which may become necessary for the orderly completion of the project. The Consultant shall assist the City in performing a final walk-through inspection and prepare a written “final punch list”.
3. Closure – The Consultant shall prepare record drawings, incorporating all changes provided by the Contractor and known variations to provide the City the best possible set of record drawings. The final record drawings shall be furnished on paper, of the same specification as provided for in the Agreement, on CD and in CADD format.

V. Additional Services

Other additional services, not included in the Scope of Services, will be negotiated with the CITY as needed. Compensation will be based upon a mutually agreed lump sum fee or an hourly rate as described below. Items that are considered additional services include:

- Geotechnical Investigation(s)
- Environmental Services - Performing National Environmental Policy Act-type environmental review, as per the requirements of the TWDB Drinking Water SRF requirements.
- Full Tree preservation/mitigation plan;
- Meetings or presentations not specified herein;
- Revisions to plans requested by the City after the plans are approved;
- Permit fees, filing fees, pro-rated fees, impact fees and taxes;
- Preparation of easement or right-of-way documents except as noted herein;
- Property acquisition or negotiations;
- Design of gas, telephone or other utility improvements except as noted herein;

- Printing of drawings, specifications and contract documents except as noted herein;
- Full-time construction inspection and preparation of as-built drawings;
- Certification that the work is built in accordance with plans and specifications (*by City inspector*);
- Graphic products except as noted in herein;
- Design of utilities or other improvements outside of the project boundary or roadway rights of way (not in scope);
- Attendance or preparation for meetings and public hearings except as noted herein;
- Quality control and material testing services during construction;
- Construction staking or inspection;
- Assisting the City in evaluating bids, attending the bid opening, and preparing the bid tabulation.
- Geological Assessment;
- Archeological Assessment;
- Property Title Research;
- Structural retaining wall design;
- Off-Site Public Road/Street Design;
- Design of off-site facilities;
- Design/coordination of power, phone and gas services;
- Negotiations/agreements with adjacent property owners;
- Technical reports for the following items are excluded from this scope of services: noise, air quality, community impacts, indirect impacts, and cumulative impacts.
- Effort to obtain right-of-entry from public or private landowners to allow for the completion of environmental services is not included in this scope of work.
- This scope of work does not include threatened or endangered species surveys, preparation of a Biological Assessment under the Endangered Species Act, or consultation with the USFWS.
- This scope of work does not include performing reconnaissance or intensive surveys for historic resources (i.e., archival research for historic structures/districts), evaluation of effects on sites determined to be eligible or listed on the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP), development of Section 106 mitigation plans, or Section 4(f) evaluations.
- The scope of work does not include a Phase I Environmental Site Assessment performed in accordance with applicable American Society for Testing and Materials (ASTM) standards or any surveys/investigations involving sampling and laboratory analysis (e.g., hazardous materials sampling and analysis, asbestos surveys, and lead-based paint surveys).

The above fees for Tasks I through IV shall be lump sum tasks and billed monthly based on percentage complete of each task. Additional Services shall be a time and materials task billed according to the Rate Schedule included in Section 3.3.6.

2. Time for Completion

The Consultant agrees to perform its services in accordance with the schedule below, to the extent over which the Consultant has control. The City agrees to review plans and other submittals and to arrange meetings in a timely manner.

- I. Commencement of Work** – The City agrees to issue written authorization to proceed as soon as practical after approval by the Bedford City Council. The Consultant agrees to commence work in accordance with the Agreement within ten (10) working days following receipt of a written authorization.

- II. Timeline** – The following items of work shall be completed within the timeline indicated.
 - 1. Completion/furnishing design surveys and subsurface utility engineering: Completed prior to contract execution.

 - 2. Completion/furnishing 30% conceptual plans and estimate of probable cost, sufficient to allow general approval of horizontal and vertical alignment and to confirm the preliminary construction cost estimate: 90 calendar days from date of written authorization excluding City review time.

 - 3. Completion/furnishing 90% preliminary plans sufficient for forwarding to utility companies to plan adjustments: 150 calendar days from date of written authorization excluding City review time.

4. Completion/furnishing 100% final plans, specifications, bid quantities, and construction cost estimate: 180 calendar days from date of written authorization, excluding City review time.
5. Bidding and construction services shall correspond to City's schedule and construction time.

3. If a surface adjustment factor is applied to the data, any surface adjustment factors used should be clearly documented on the drawing.
4. If submissions for the Project relate to a plat, the file submitted must match exactly the plat that is submitted for recording.
5. The file shall contain required features for the project type as detailed below:
 - a. Pre-Construction/As-Built Plans and/or Record Documents:
 - i. Layers from Final Plat Requirements as Applicable to Project Type,
 - ii. Water Utility Features,
 - iii. Sanitary Sewer Features,
 - iv. Storm Sewer Features,
 - v. Paving Features,
 - vi. Franchised Utility Features, if applicable
 - vii. Vertical Infrastructure, if applicable
6. Each required feature group should be provided as a separate layer within the file.
7. Layer names should be representative of the information contained in the layer.
8. Line work should be continuous (e.g. no dashed lines in required layers) and complete (connecting lines should meet at corners) within the subdivision/project. Layers outside of project/subdivision boundary may be dashed In CAD data as required for Final Plats by City of Bedford Subdivision Ordinance.

I. **CONSULTANT'S RESPONSIBILITY**. Consultant shall be solely responsible for the auditing and accuracy of all Direct Expenses, approved markup (general and/or administrative), and approved travel and/or subsistence charges, including those of its subcontractors, prior to submitting to City for reimbursement. Any over-payment by City for errors in submittals for reimbursement may be deducted from Consultant's subsequent payment(s) for services; however, this shall not be City's sole and exclusive remedy for said over-payment.

II. **GUIDELINES FOR DIRECT EXPENSES**.

A. **Local Transportation** – Transportation in connection with the Project, when such transportation is not a function of routine performance of the duties of Consultant in connection with the Project, and when such transportation exceeds beyond fifty (50) miles from the Project site, shall be reimbursed at a standard mileage rate consistent with that as issued, and periodically revised, by the United States Internal Revenue Service (IRS). Under no circumstances shall City reimburse Consultant at a higher standard mileage rate or pay additional markup on charges for local transportation. Completion of City's Standard Mileage Log is required for submittal of these charges for reimbursement, including justification for each submitted expense.

Under no circumstances are charges associated with rental cars for local transportation eligible for reimbursement by City. Toll road subscriptions or toll plaza receipts are not reimbursable. Consultant agrees to place these standards in all subcontracts for work on the Project.

B. **Supplies, Material, Equipment** – City shall reimburse the actual cost of other similar direct Project-related expenses, which are duly presented in advance and approved by City's Project Manager in writing.

C. **Commercial Reproduction** – City shall reimburse the actual cost of reproductions, specifically limited to progress prints prepared for presentation to City at each phase of progress, and final Construction Documents prepared for distribution at bidding phase, provided that Consultant has duly obtained at least three (3) quotations from commercial firms and has chosen the best value for City. Consultant shall provide such documentation to City for review prior to submitting these expenses for reimbursement. Consultant agrees to place these standards in all subcontracts for work on the Project.

D. **In-House Reproduction** – Consultant shall make arrangements with City for prior approval of in-house reproduction rates prior to submitting these expenses for reimbursement. City shall provide Consultant with a standard format for documenting these charges. Completion of City's reproduction log is required as

a prerequisite for payment, including the number or reproductions, the date, time, description, the approved standard rate, and a justification for each submitted expense for reimbursement. Consultant agrees to place these standards in all subcontracts for work on the Project.

- E. **Commercial Plotting** – City shall reimburse the actual cost of plots, specifically limited to final documents, provided Consultant has duly obtained at least three (3) quotations from commercial firms and has chosen the best value for City. Consultant shall provide such documentation to City for review prior to submitting these expenses for reimbursement. Consultant agrees to place these standards in all subcontracts for work on the Project.
- F. **In-House Plotting** – Consultant shall make arrangements with City for prior written approval of in-house plotting rates prior to submitting these charges for reimbursement. City shall provide Consultant with a standard format for documenting these charges. Completion of City's reproduction log is required as a prerequisite for payment, including the number of plots, the date, time, description, the approved standard rate, and a justification for each submitted charge for reimbursement.
- G. **Communications** – Reimbursement for expenses relating to electronic communications shall be limited to long-distance telephone or fax toll charges specifically required in the discharge of professional responsibilities related to the Project. Telephone service charges including office or cellular phones, WATTS, or Metro line services or similar charges are not reimbursable.
- H. **Postage, Mail, and Delivery Service** – City shall reimburse the actual cost of postage and delivery of Instruments of Service, provided Consultant duly considers all circumstances (including available time for assured delivery) of the required delivery and selects the best value for City, which may require comparison of delivery costs offered by three (3) or more sources or methods of delivery, which at a minimum shall include U.S. Mail. Courier service is acceptable only in circumstances requiring deadline-sensitive deliveries and not for the convenience of Consultant and/or Consultant's employees. Consultant agrees to place these standards in all subcontracts for work on the Project.
- I. **Meals and Other Related Charges** – Meals or any other related expenses are not reimbursable unless incurred outside a fifty (50) mile radius of the Project, and then only reimbursable for the actual cost subject to compliance with City's currently adopted policy. Non-allowable costs include, but are not limited to, charges for entertainment, alcoholic beverages, and gratuities.

III. GUIDELINES FOR GENERAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE MARKUP.

- A. **Requirement of Prior Approval** – Consultant may be allowed to charge a General and/or Administrative Markup on work completed if Consultant can clearly define to City specifically what costs are included in the markup calculation. To apply General and/or Administrative Markup, Consultant must also document to City what costs would be considered direct costs. City shall issue approval in writing to allow Consultant to charge General and/or Administrative Markup. City reserves the right to reject any and all requests for General and/or Administrative Markup.

IV. GUIDELINES FOR TRAVEL AND SUBSISTENCE EXPENSES.

- A. **Requirement of Prior Approval** – City shall reimburse the actual cost of travel and/or subsistence expenses upon prior written approval by City’s Project Manager.
- B. **Adherence to Currently Adopted City Travel Policy** – Reimbursements shall be governed by the same travel policies provided for City employees according to current adopted policy. Prior to the event, Consultant shall request, and City’s Project Manager shall provide the provisions and the restrictions that apply to out-of-town reimbursements.

- A. Such policies shall provide for a waiver of subrogation against City for injuries, including death, property damage or any other loss to the extent the same is covered by the proceeds of the insurance.

II. INSURANCE COMPANY QUALIFICATION – All insurance companies providing the required insurance shall be authorized to transact business in the State of Texas, and shall have a minimum rating of “A” by A.M. Best’s Key Rating Guide, or other equivalent rating service(s).

III. CERTIFICATE OF INSURANCE – A Certificate of Insurance and policy endorsement(s) evidencing the required insurance shall be submitted prior to execution of the Agreement. If the Agreement is renewed or extended by City, a Certificate of Insurance and policy endorsement(s) shall also be provided to City prior to the date the Agreement is renewed or extended.



SUMMARY:

This item is to consider amending the executive order of Mayor Michael Boyter issued on April 7, 2020 in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

BACKGROUND:

Under the authority given to him by Section 418.108 of the Texas Government Code, Mayor Michael Boyter ordered a Declaration of Local Disaster Due to Public Health Emergency on March 19, 2020 and Executive Orders on March 25 and April 7, 2020 in response to the COVID-19 pandemic and its current and potential impact on the City of Bedford.

Since that time, Governor Greg Abbott issued Executive Orders GA-15, GA-16 and GA-17 on April 20, 2020, and is set to issue further orders on April 27, 2020. Tarrant County Judge Glen Whitley issued a modified Executive Order on April 21, 2020 in response to Governor Abbott's orders and will presumably issue another modified order based on what the orders the Governor issues on April 27, 2020. Once that occurs, this communique and attachments will be updated to reflect Judge Whitley's latest order.

TARRANT COUNTY

EXECUTIVE ORDER OF COUNTY JUDGE B. GLEN WHITLEY

(Amended by Commissioners Court action on March 24, 2020)

(Modified by the County Judge on March 27, 2020)

(Modified by the County Judge on April 3, 2020)

(Modified by the County Judge on April 21, 2020)

WHEREAS, pursuant to Texas Government Code § 418.108, Tarrant County Judge B. Glen Whitley issued a Declaration of Local Disaster due to Public Health Emergency on March 13, 2020 due to imminent threat of widespread illness from COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, the County Judge has determined that extraordinary measures must be taken to mitigate the effects of this public health emergency and to facilitate the efficient, rapid, and cooperative response to the emergency; and

WHEREAS, the County Judge issued a Declaration of Local Disaster due to Public Health Emergency on March 13, 2020 and the County Commissioners issued a Renewal of Declaration of Local Disaster due to Public Health Emergency on March 17, 2020, and on March 18, 2020, the County Judge issued a First Amended Declaration of Local Disaster due to Public Health Emergency. The County Judge issued a Second Amended Declaration of Local Disaster due to Public Health Emergency to implement additional measures to ensure the protection of the residents of Tarrant County on March 21, 2020. County Commissioners issued a Renewal of Second Amended Declaration of Local Disaster due to Public Health Emergency on March 24, 2020.

WHEREAS, to remain consistent with the declaration of the Texas Department of State Health Services and the executive orders issued by Governor Greg Abbott and to harmonize to the extent possible, the executive orders of Governor Greg Abbott, the Tarrant County Judge and the mandates contained in the declarations of the Mayors of the Cities of Fort Worth, Arlington and the other cities of Tarrant County, the County Judge issues this Executive Order.

THEREFORE, Pursuant to Texas Government Code Chapter 418, Be It Proclaimed and **ORDERED** by the County Judge that:

1. That a state of disaster and public health emergency has been declared for Tarrant County, pursuant to § 418.108(a) of the Texas Government Code.
2. That this Executive Order shall be given prompt and general publicity and shall be filed promptly with the County Clerk, pursuant to § 418.108(c) of the Texas Government Code.
3. That the Tarrant County Emergency Operations Plan has been activated and implemented, pursuant to § 418.108(d) of the Texas Government Code.
4. That this Executive Order authorizes the County to take any actions necessary to promote health and suppress disease, including quarantine, evacuation, regulating ingress and egress from a disaster area and controlling the movement of persons and the occupancy of premises, pursuant to § 418.108(f), (g) of the Texas Government Code.

5. All persons currently residing within the incorporated and unincorporated territory of Tarrant County shall stay at their place of residence, except as allowed by this Order. All persons may leave their residences only for Essential Travel, Essential Services, and Essential Activities, to work in or access Essential Businesses, Government Service, or Essential Critical Infrastructure, or to perform Minimum Basic Operations, as defined below.

To the extent individuals are using shared or outdoor spaces, they must maintain Social Distancing and minimize in-person contact with people who are not in the same household.

Nothing in this Executive Order is intended to restrict "essential services" as such term is defined in Governor Abbott's Executive Order GA-14 (Order GA-14), nor is it intended to allow gatherings prohibited by Order GA-14. To the extent that the Texas Division of Emergency Management approves additions to "essential services", those additions will be treated as an Essential Business in Tarrant County. Nothing herein is intended to impose restrictions inconsistent with Order GA-14 or any other order issued by the Governor currently in effect relating to COVID-19 (a COVID Order). To the extent that this Executive Order conflicts with a COVID Order, the provisions in a COVID Order prevail.¹

6. All businesses operating in Tarrant County, except Essential Businesses as defined herein, shall not allow members of the public to occupy business premises. Non-essential businesses may continue Minimum Basic Operations, as outlined below, so long as the businesses strictly adhere to the following: (1) minimize in-person contact with people who are not in the same household; (2) maintain Social Distancing; (3) utilize remote teleworking to the greatest extent possible; and (4) minimize the number of employees needed to operate at a basic level.

Minimum Basic Operations allows the minimum necessary activities to:

- a. Maintain the value of the business's inventory or equipment, process payroll and employee benefits, maintain the premises and the security of the premises, equipment or inventory, including the care and maintenance of livestock or animals;
 - b. IT or other operations that facilitate employees working from home; and
 - c. Facilitate online or call-in sales; and/or perform in-store repair services.
7. It is ordered that a restaurant with or without drive-in or drive-through services; drive-in restaurant; drive-through restaurant; or microbrewery, micro-distillery, or winery may only provide take out, delivery, curbside pickup or drive-in or drive-through services as allowed by law. Social Distancing is required.
 8. All public or private gatherings of any number of people occurring outside a single household or living unit are prohibited, except as otherwise provided herein. Nothing in this Executive Order prohibits the gathering of members of a household or living unit nor does it prohibit any gathering expressly permitted by Order GA-14 or any subsequent Order by Governor Abbott.
 9. Licensed health care professionals and all licensed health care facilities shall refer to Governor Abbott's Executive Order GA-15 for direction on permissible activities.
 10. If someone in a household has tested positive for COVID-19, the household is ordered to isolate at home. Members of the household cannot go to work, school, or any other community function until cleared by a medical professional but may seek medical services as needed from medical personnel and facilities.

¹ All questions relating to a COVID Order shall be directed to the Texas Division of Emergency Management via email at EssentialServices@tdem.texas.gov. Information is also available at www.tdem.texas.gov/essentialservices.

11. Nursing homes, retirement, and long-term care facilities are to prohibit non-essential visitors from accessing their facilities unless to provide critical assistance or for end-of-life visitation.
12. Individuals experiencing homelessness are strongly urged to obtain shelter and maintain Social Distancing when feasible. If a homeless person is sheltered and exhibits symptoms or is diagnosed, the shelter's isolation center shall be deemed the residence of the homeless person solely for the purpose of complying with the requirements of this Executive Order. Medical personnel shall make the decision whether any other shelter residents shall be required to isolate based on potential exposure. Available shelters, to the maximum extent practicable, must use COVID-19 risk mitigation practices in their operations.

13. Definitions:

- a. Social Distancing means maintaining at least 6 feet distance from other individuals, frequently washing hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, using hand sanitizer, covering coughs or sneezes (into the sleeve or elbow, not the hands), regularly disinfecting high touch surfaces, and not shaking hands.
- b. Minimum Basic Operations include the following, provided the businesses strictly adhere to the following: (1) minimize in-person contact with people who are not in the same household; (2) maintain Social Distancing; (3) utilize remote teleworking to the greatest extent possible; and (4) minimize the number of employees needed to operate at a basic level.

Minimum Basic Operations allows the minimum necessary activities to:

- Maintain the value of the business's inventory or equipment, process payroll and employee benefits, maintain the premises and the security of the premises, equipment or inventory, including the care and maintenance of livestock or animals;
 - IT or other operations that facilitate employees working from home; and
 - Facilitate online or call-in sales; and/or perform in-store repair services.
- c. Essential Activities includes any of the following:
 - i. To engage in activities or perform tasks essential to their health and safety, or to the health and safety of their family or household members (for example, obtaining medical supplies or medication, visiting a health care professional, or obtaining supplies need to work from home).
 - ii. To obtain necessary services or supplies for themselves and their family or household members, or to deliver those services or supplies to others (for example, food, pet and livestock supplies, and any other household consumer products, and products necessary to maintain the safety, sanitation, and essential operation of residences). It is strongly recommended that households, to the greatest extent possible, send only one person to businesses for the purpose of picking up food or other essential items.
 - iii. To engage in outdoor activity, provided the individuals comply with Social Distancing (for example, walking, biking, hiking, golfing, or running).
 - iv. To perform work providing essential products and services at an Essential Business or to otherwise carry out activities specifically permitted in this Executive Order.
 - v. To care for a family member or pet in another household.
 - d. Essential Businesses:
 - i. Essential Health Care Services. Healthcare operations, including hospitals, clinics, doctors, dentists, pharmacies, pharmaceutical and biotechnology companies, other healthcare facilities, healthcare suppliers, home healthcare services providers, mental health providers, substance abuse providers, blood banks, medical research, or any related and/or ancillary healthcare services, veterinary care provided to animals. Home-based care for seniors, adults, or children. Residential facilities and shelters for seniors, adults, and children. Healthcare operations do not include fitness and exercise gyms and similar facilities.
 - ii. Essential Government Functions. All services provided by local, state and federal governments needed to ensure the continuing operation of the government

agencies to provide for the health, safety and welfare of the public. All Essential Government Functions shall be performed in compliance with Social Distancing, to the extent possible.

- iii. Essential Critical Infrastructure. Pursuant to the direction of Governor Abbott, everything listed by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security in its current guidance issued by the National Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Agency (CISA).
- iv. Essential Retail. Food service providers, including grocery stores, warehouse stores, liquor stores, bodegas, gas stations, convenience stores, and farmers' markets and other retail stores that sell food products and household staples, pet and feed stores. Businesses not open to the public that ship or deliver groceries, food, goods or services directly to residences. Restaurants and other facilities that prepare and serve food, but only for delivery, take out, drive-in, drive-through, curb side pickup, or carry out. Schools and other entities that typically provide free services to students or members of the public on a pick-up and take-away basis only. The restriction of delivery or carry out does not apply to cafes and restaurants located within hospital and medical facilities. Laundromats, dry cleaners, and laundry service providers. Businesses that provide for the delivery of, or preparation of vehicles. Businesses that supply products needed for people to work from home, including businesses providing mail and shipping and post office box. Businesses that supply products necessary for essential repairs and maintenance of a home or business. Hotel, motels, and shared rental units, except that all bars, cafes, or restaurants in hotels, motels, and shared rental units are closed except for pick-up and room service.
- v. Providers of Basic Necessities to Economically Disadvantaged Populations. Social services and charitable organizations that provide food, shelter, and social services, and other necessities of life for economically disadvantaged or otherwise needy individuals; that provide food, shelter, and social services, and other necessities of life for economically disadvantaged or otherwise vulnerable individuals.
- vi. Essential Services Necessary to Maintain Essential Operations of Residences or Other Essential Businesses. Trash and recycling collection, processing and disposal, mail and shipping services, building cleaning and maintenance, auto repair, warehouse/distribution and fulfillment, and storage for essential businesses. Plumbers, pool services, yard maintenance and landscapers, security services, electricians, exterminators, and other service providers who provide services that are necessary to maintaining the safety, sanitation, and essential operations of residences, Essential Activities, and Essential Businesses. Professional services, such as legal or accounting services.
- vii. News Media. Newspapers, television, radio, and other media services.
- viii. Financial Institutions. Banks and related financial institutions, consumer lenders, alternative financial services companies, sales and finance lenders, credit unions, appraisers, and title companies. As much business as possible shall be conducted with web-based technology to limit in-person contact.
- ix. Real Estate Transactions: Services related to current real estate transactions. As much business as possible shall be conducted with web-based technology to limit in-person contact. This order does not prohibit showings so long as CDC guidance is strictly followed.
- x. Childcare Services. Childcare facilities providing services that enable employees who perform Essential Activities or work for an Essential Business to work as permitted.
- xi. Animal Shelters, Zoos, and Other Businesses that Maintain Live Animals. Businesses that maintain and care for live animals are not permitted to allow any visitors or patrons but may continue to operate to the extent necessary to provide the necessary care for the animals. Nothing in this section shall prohibit a non-

- employee from entering the premises to perform a health care services or another Essential Business service.
- xii. Construction. Construction under a valid permit issued by a governmental entity.
 - xiii. Funeral Services. Funeral homes, crematoriums and cemeteries may operate.
 - xiv. Wedding Services. Weddings may be held, but not more than ten persons may be present at any one time. Social Distancing is required. Weddings may not be held inside a County building.
 - xv. Worship Services. Religious services conducted in churches, congregations, and houses of worship are permitted if they cannot be conducted from home or through remote services, so long as Social Distancing is maintained, and existing guidelines set forth by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) are followed. Religious services held outdoors whereby individuals remain in their vehicles are strongly encouraged.
Order GA-14 orders that religious services "should be conducted consistent with the Guidelines from the President and the CDC..."²
 - xvi. Moving Services and Supply. Businesses that provide residential and/or commercial moving services and necessary moving supplies.
- e. Essential Travel. For the purposes of this Executive Order, Essential Travel includes travel for any of the following purposes.
- i. Any travel related to the provision of or access to Essential Activities, Essential Governmental Functions, and Essential Businesses Essential Critical Infrastructure, Minimum Basic Operation;
 - ii. Travel to care for elderly, minors, dependents, persons with disabilities, or other vulnerable persons;
 - iii. Travel to or from educational institutions for purposes of receiving materials for distance learning, for receiving meals, and any other related services;
 - iv. Travel to return to a place of residence from outside the jurisdiction;
 - v. Travel required by law enforcement or court order;
 - vi. Travel by church staff or clergy for the purpose of production of remote delivery of religious services and other ministries requiring travel;
 - vii. Travel related to attending a funeral service; or
 - viii. Travel required for non-residents to return to their place of residence outside the County. Individuals are strongly encouraged to verify that their transportation out of the County remains available and functional prior to commencing such travel.
- f. Essential Services. Essential Services means services, by whomsoever rendered, and whether rendered to the government or to any other person, the interruption of which would endanger life, health or personal safety of the whole or part of the population.

14. This Executive Order does not restrict business operations delivering Essential Services, pursuant to Attorney General Ken Paxton's Opinion No. KP-0296 and CISA.


15. That any certified peace officer or other person with lawful authority is hereby authorized to enforce the provisions of this Executive Order in accordance with the authority granted under the Texas

Disaster Act of 1975. Any person who violates this Executive Order may be subject to a fine not exceeding \$1,000 or confinement for a period not exceeding 180 days.

16. That this Executive Order incorporates the attached table, Disaster Restrictions, as if set forth verbatim herein. In the event of a conflict, the text within this Executive Order prevails.
17. The sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses and phrases of this Executive Order are severable and if any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph or section of this Executive Order should be declared invalid by the final judgment or decree of any court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity shall not affect any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences paragraphs and sections that can be given effect without the invalid provision, and to this end, the provisions of this Executive Order are severable.
18. This Executive Order is issued in accordance with and incorporates by reference any declaration of disaster previously issued and adopted by Tarrant County. In the event of a conflict between this Executive Order and a prior declaration or order pertaining to COVID -19, this Executive Order prevails.
19. This Executive Order shall take effect at 11:59 p.m. on April 21, 2020, and shall remain in effect until April 30, 2020, unless terminated or modified by a subsequent Order.





EXECUTIVE ORDER GA 15

Relating to hospital capacity during the COVID-19 disaster.

WHEREAS, I, Greg Abbott, Governor of Texas, issued a disaster proclamation on March 13, 2020, certifying under Section 418.014 of the Texas Government Code that the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) poses an imminent threat of disaster for all counties in the State of Texas; and

WHEREAS, on April 12, 2020, I issued a proclamation renewing the disaster declaration for all counties in Texas; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioner of the Texas Department of State Health Services, Dr. John Hellerstedt, has determined that COVID-19 represents a public health disaster within the meaning of Chapter 81 of the Texas Health and Safety Code; and

WHEREAS, I have issued numerous executive orders and suspensions of Texas laws in response to COVID-19, aimed at protecting the health and safety of Texans and ensuring an effective response to this disaster; and

WHEREAS, a shortage of hospital capacity or personal protective equipment would hinder efforts to cope with the COVID-19 disaster; and

WHEREAS, hospital capacity and personal protective equipment were being depleted by surgeries and procedures that were not medically necessary to correct a serious medical condition or to preserve the life of a patient, contrary to recommendations from the President's Coronavirus Task Force, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the U.S. Surgeon General, and the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services; and

WHEREAS, various hospital licensing requirements would stand in the way of implementing increased occupancy in the event of surge needs for hospital capacity due to COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, I issued Executive Order GA-09 on March 22, 2020, in an effort to avoid a shortage of hospital capacity or personal protective equipment, and it is subject to expiration at 11:59 p.m. on April 21, 2020, absent further action by the governor; and

WHEREAS, the "governor is responsible for meeting ... the dangers to the state and people presented by disasters" under Section 418.011 of the Texas Government Code, and the legislature has given the governor broad authority to fulfill that responsibility; and

WHEREAS, under Section 418.012, the “governor may issue executive orders ... hav[ing] the force and effect of law;” and

WHEREAS, under Section 418.016(a), the “governor may suspend the provisions of any regulatory statute prescribing the procedures for conduct of state business or the orders or rules of a state agency if strict compliance with the provisions, orders, or rules would in any way prevent, hinder, or delay necessary action in coping with a disaster;” and

WHEREAS, under Section 418.173, failure to comply with any executive order issued during the COVID-19 disaster is an offense punishable by a fine not to exceed \$1,000, confinement in jail for a term not to exceed 180 days, or both fine and confinement.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Greg Abbott, Governor of Texas, by virtue of the power and authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, do hereby order the following on a statewide basis beginning at 11:59 p.m. on April 21, 2020, and continuing until 11:59 p.m. on May 8, 2020:

All licensed health care professionals and all licensed health care facilities shall postpone all surgeries and procedures that are not medically necessary to diagnose or correct a serious medical condition of, or to preserve the life of, a patient who without timely performance of the surgery or procedure would be at risk for serious adverse medical consequences or death, as determined by the patient’s physician; provided, however, that this prohibition shall not apply to either of the following:

- any procedure that, if performed in accordance with the commonly accepted standard of clinical practice, would not deplete the hospital capacity or the personal protective equipment needed to cope with the COVID-19 disaster; or
- any surgery or procedure performed in a licensed health care facility that has certified in writing to the Texas Health and Human Services Commission both: (1) that it will reserve at least 25% of its hospital capacity for treatment of COVID-19 patients, accounting for the range of clinical severity of COVID-19 patients; and (2) that it will not request any personal protective equipment from any public source, whether federal, state, or local, for the duration of the COVID-19 disaster.

I hereby continue the suspension of the following provisions to the extent necessary to implement increased occupancy in the event of surge needs for hospital capacity due to COVID-19:

Any other pertinent regulations or statutes, upon written approval of the Office of the Governor.





EXECUTIVE ORDER GA 16

*Relating to the safe, strategic reopening of select services as the first step to
Open Texas in response to the COVID-19 disaster.*

WHEREAS, I, Greg Abbott, Governor of Texas, issued a disaster proclamation on March 13, 2020, certifying under Section 418.014 of the Texas Government Code that the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) poses an imminent threat of disaster for all counties in the State of Texas; and

WHEREAS, on April 12, 2020, I issued a proclamation renewing the disaster declaration for all counties in Texas; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioner of the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS), Dr. John Hellerstedt, has determined that COVID-19 represents a public health disaster within the meaning of Chapter 81 of the Texas Health and Safety Code; and

WHEREAS, I have issued numerous executive orders and suspensions of Texas laws in response to COVID-19, aimed at protecting the health and safety of Texans and ensuring an effective response to this disaster; and

WHEREAS, I issued Executive Order GA-08 on March 19, 2020, mandating certain obligations for Texans in accordance with the President's Coronavirus Guidelines for America, as promulgated by President Donald J. Trump and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) on March 16, 2020, which called upon Americans to take actions to slow the spread of COVID-19 for 15 days; and

WHEREAS, shortly before Executive Order GA-08 expired, I issued Executive Order GA-14 on March 31, 2020, based on the President's announcement that the restrictive social-distancing Guidelines should extend through April 30, 2020, in light of advice from Dr. Anthony Fauci and Dr. Deborah Birx, and also based on guidance by DSHS Commissioner Dr. Hellerstedt and White House Coronavirus Response Coordinator Dr. Birx that the spread of COVID-19 can be reduced by minimizing social gatherings; and

WHEREAS, Executive Order GA-14 superseded Executive Order GA-08 and expanded the social-distancing restrictions and other obligations for Texans that are aimed at slowing the spread of COVID-19, including by limiting social gatherings and in-person contact with people (other than those in the same household) to providing or obtaining "essential services," and by expressly adopting the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's March 28, 2020 Guidance on the Essential Critical Infrastructure Workforce, Version 2.0, which provides a list of critical-infrastructure sectors, workers, and functions that should continue as "essential services" during the COVID-19 response; and

WHEREAS, Executive Order GA-14 therefore restricts non-essential services during the COVID-19 disaster; and

WHEREAS, although many lives have been saved because of social-distancing restrictions like those required by Executive Order GA-14, more than 400 Texans have lost their lives because of COVID-19, and the disease still presents a serious threat across Texas that could persist in certain areas; and

WHEREAS, apart from the threats to health and safety, COVID-19 has also wrought havoc on the many Texas businesses and workers affected by social-distancing restrictions that were necessary to protect human life; and

WHEREAS, over one million unemployment claims have been filed during the COVID-19 disaster by conscientious Texans who want to get back to work as soon as it is safe to do so; and

WHEREAS, Texas must protect lives while restoring livelihoods, both of which can be achieved with the expert advice of medical professionals and business leaders; and

WHEREAS, today I am also issuing Executive Order GA-17, creating the Governor's Strike Force to Open Texas to study and make recommendations on safely and strategically restarting and revitalizing all aspects of the Lone Star State—work, school, entertainment, and culture; and

WHEREAS, the “governor is responsible for meeting ... the dangers to the state and people presented by disasters” under Section 418.011 of the Texas Government Code, and the legislature has given the governor broad authority to fulfill that responsibility; and

WHEREAS, under Section 418.012, the “governor may issue executive orders ... hav[ing] the force and effect of law;” and

WHEREAS, under Section 418.016(a), the “governor may suspend the provisions of any regulatory statute prescribing the procedures for conduct of state business ... if strict compliance with the provisions ... would in any way prevent, hinder, or delay necessary action in coping with a disaster;” and

WHEREAS, under Section 418.017(a), the “governor may use all available resources of state government and of political subdivisions that are reasonably necessary to cope with a disaster;” and

WHEREAS, under Section 418.018(c), the “governor may control ingress and egress to and from a disaster area and the movement of persons and the occupancy of premises in the area;” and

WHEREAS, under Section 418.173, failure to comply with any executive order issued during the COVID-19 disaster is an offense punishable by a fine not to exceed \$1,000, confinement in jail for a term not to exceed 180 days, or both fine and confinement.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Greg Abbott, Governor of Texas, by virtue of the power and authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, do hereby order the following on a statewide basis effective immediately, and continuing through April

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30, 2020, subject to extension based on the status of COVID-19 in Texas and the recommendations of the CDC and the White House Coronavirus Task Force:

In accordance with guidance from DSHS Commissioner Dr. Hellerstedt, and to achieve the goals established by the President to reduce the spread of COVID-19, every person in Texas shall, except where necessary to provide or obtain essential services or reopened services, minimize social gatherings and minimize in-person contact with people who are not in the same household.

“Essential services” shall consist of everything listed by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) in its Guidance on the Essential Critical Infrastructure Workforce, Version 2.0 or any subsequent version, plus religious services conducted in churches, congregations, and houses of worship. Other essential services may be added to this list with the approval of the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM). TDEM shall maintain an online list of essential services, as specified in this executive order and any approved additions. Requests for additions should be directed to TDEM at EssentialServices@tdem.texas.gov or by visiting www.tdem.texas.gov/essentialservices.

“Reopened services” shall consist of:

- Starting at 12:01 a.m. on Friday, April 24, 2020, retail services that are not “essential services,” but that may be provided through pickup, delivery by mail, or delivery to the customer’s doorstep in strict compliance with the terms required by DSHS. The DSHS requirements may be found at www.dshs.texas.gov/coronavirus.
- Such additional services as may be enumerated by future executive orders or proclamations by the governor.

In providing or obtaining essential services or reopened services, people and businesses should follow the Guidelines from the President and the CDC by practicing good hygiene, environmental cleanliness, and sanitation, implementing social distancing, and working from home if possible. In particular, all such services should be provided through remote telework from home unless they cannot be provided through remote telework. Religious services should be conducted in accordance with the Guidelines for Houses of Worship During the COVID-19 Crisis, as promulgated by the attorney general and governor.

In accordance with the Guidelines from the President and the CDC, people shall avoid eating or drinking at bars, restaurants, and food courts, or visiting gyms, massage establishments, tattoo studios, piercing studios, or cosmetology salons; provided, however, that the use of drive-thru, pickup, or delivery options for food and drinks is allowed and highly encouraged throughout the limited duration of this executive order.

This executive order does not prohibit people from accessing essential or reopened services or engaging in essential daily activities, such as going to the grocery store or gas station, providing or obtaining other essential or reopened services, visiting parks, hunting or fishing, or engaging in physical activity like jogging or bicycling, so long as the necessary precautions are maintained to reduce the transmission of COVID-19 and to minimize in-person contact with people who are not in the same household.

In accordance with the Guidelines from the President and the CDC, people shall not visit nursing homes, state supported living centers, assisted living facilities, or long-term care facilities unless to provide critical assistance as determined through guidance from the Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC). Nursing homes, state supported living centers, assisted living facilities, and long-term care facilities should follow infection control policies and practices set forth by the HHSC, including minimizing the movement of staff between facilities whenever possible.

In accordance with the Guidelines from the President and the CDC, schools shall remain temporarily closed to in-person classroom attendance by students and shall not recommence before the end of the 2019-2020 school year. Public education teachers and staff are encouraged to continue to work remotely from home if possible, but may return to schools to conduct remote video instruction, as well as perform administrative duties, under the strict terms required by the Texas Education Agency. Private schools and institutions of higher education should establish similar terms to allow teachers and staff to return to schools to conduct remote video instruction and perform administrative duties when it is not possible to do so remotely from home.

This executive order shall supersede any conflicting order issued by local officials in response to the COVID-19 disaster, but only to the extent that such a local order restricts essential services or reopened services allowed by this executive order or allows gatherings prohibited by this executive order. I hereby suspend Sections 418.1015(b) and 418.108 of the Texas Government Code, Chapter 81, Subchapter E of the Texas Health and Safety Code, and any other relevant statutes, to the extent necessary to ensure that local officials do not impose restrictions inconsistent with this executive order, provided that local officials may enforce this executive order as well as local restrictions that are consistent with this executive order.

This executive order supersedes Executive Order GA-14, but does not supersede Executive Orders GA-09, GA-10, GA-11, GA-12, GA-13, or GA-15. This executive order shall remain in effect and in full force until 11:59 p.m. on April 30, 2020, unless it is modified, amended, rescinded, or superseded by the governor.



WHEREAS, I, Greg Abbott, Governor of Texas, issued a disaster proclamation on March 13, 2020, certifying under Section 418.014 of the Texas Government Code that the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) poses an imminent threat of disaster for all counties in the State of Texas; and

WHEREAS, on April 12, 2020, I issued a proclamation renewing the disaster declaration for all counties in Texas; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioner of the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS), Dr. John Hellerstedt, has determined that COVID-19 represents a public health disaster within the meaning of Chapter 81 of the Texas Health and Safety Code; and

WHEREAS, I have issued numerous executive orders and suspensions of Texas laws in response to COVID-19, aimed at protecting the health and safety of Texans and ensuring an effective response to this disaster; and

WHEREAS, Executive Order GA-14, issued on March 31, 2020, mandated certain social-distancing restrictions and other obligations for Texans that are aimed at slowing the spread of COVID-19 according to federal guidelines; and

WHEREAS, although many lives have been saved because of social-distancing restrictions like those required by Executive Order GA-14, more than 400 Texans have lost their lives because of COVID-19, and the disease still presents a serious threat across Texas that could persist in certain areas; and

WHEREAS, apart from the threats to health and safety, COVID-19 has also wrought havoc on the many Texas businesses and workers affected by social-distancing restrictions that were necessary to protect human life; and

WHEREAS, over one million unemployment claims have been filed during the COVID-19 disaster by conscientious Texans who want to get back to work as soon as it is safe to do so; and

WHEREAS, Texas must protect lives while restoring livelihoods, both of which can be achieved with the expert advice of medical professionals and business leaders; and

WHEREAS, today I have issued Executive Order GA-16 to replace Executive Order GA-14, and while it generally continues to mandate the same social-distancing restrictions

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and other obligations for Texans according to federal guidelines, Executive Order GA-16 offers a safe, strategic first step to Open Texas by permitting, starting on Friday, April 24, 2020, retail pick-up and delivery services under the strict conditions required by DSHS, and it also makes clear that teachers and staff can return to schools to conduct remote video instruction and perform administrative duties under certain restrictions; and

WHEREAS, the “governor is responsible for meeting ... the dangers to the state and people presented by disasters” under Section 418.011 of the Texas Government Code, and the legislature has given the governor broad authority to fulfill that responsibility; and

WHEREAS, under Section 418.012, the “governor may issue executive orders ... hav[ing] the force and effect of law;” and

WHEREAS, under Section 418.017(a), the “governor may use all available resources of state government and of political subdivisions that are reasonably necessary to cope with a disaster.”

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Greg Abbott, Governor of Texas, by virtue of the power and authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, do hereby order the following:

Creation and Duties. The Governor’s Strike Force to Open Texas, hereafter referred to as the Strike Force, is hereby created to advise the governor on safely and strategically restarting and revitalizing all aspects of the Lone Star State—work, school, entertainment, and culture. The Strike Force will represent a collaboration among medical professionals and public and private leaders, and shall have as its principal charges the following advisory duties, as well as any other advisory tasks assigned by the governor:

1. Study and make recommendations, in consultation with state health officials, for revitalizing the Texas economy during our recovery from the COVID-19 disaster, including without limitation on the following topics:
 - a. Safely reopening Texas businesses across a variety of sectors in a strategic, healthy, and productive manner that protects workers and consumers, especially our most vulnerable populations, while also spurring economic recovery and growth;
 - b. Providing the necessary training and resources, based on White House and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention best practices, to position Texas workers and businesses to recover from and thrive after the COVID-19 disaster;
 - c. Re-stabilizing individuals and families who have been economically affected by the COVID-19 disaster;
 - d. Safely and responsibly revitalizing key Texas institutions, including without limitation those focused on workforce and economic development, education, health care, energy, infrastructure, and arts, culture, and entertainment;
 - e. Maximizing the use of federal funding and other available resources to recharge the Texas economy;
 - f. Restoring health care services for Texans as soon as reasonably practicable for each type of service in light of the health and safety concerns and in consultation with each applicable state regulatory agency;

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- g. Spurring the recovery and growth of small businesses in Texas;
 - h. Advancing economic growth in rural communities in Texas;
 - i. Ensuring fiscal responsibility and accountability in the coming phases of economic revitalization, including the expeditious and efficient deployment of resources provided by the federal government through stimulus programs; and
 - j. Keeping Texas the top destination for businesses looking to move or reopen.
2. Study and make recommendations, in consultation with state health officials, to safely ease restrictions on Texas businesses in the aftermath of the spread of COVID-19, including without limitation the restrictions imposed by my executive orders and those imposed by local officials; and
 3. In coordination with the Office of the Governor, collaborate with key partners, including state leaders, state regulatory agencies, local governments and entities, and private-sector professionals, in studying and making recommendations of strategies and best practices for economic revitalization.

Immediate Deadlines. With Executive Order GA-16 set to expire on April 30, 2020, and given my expectation that it will not be extended in its current form, the Strike Force must provide immediate and ongoing recommendations consistent with the advisory duties outlined above, including advice regarding the safe reopening of Texas businesses in a strategic, healthy, and productive manner. This shall include recommendations about any prudent reopening measures that can be implemented between now and May 1, 2020. This advice should include the types of businesses and services to reopen, the extent to which the providers of those services may function, and any restrictions that should be placed upon those services and service providers.

Chief Operating Officer. The governor will designate a chief operating officer of the Strike Force, who will be employed by the Office of the Governor and perform all Strike Force duties as a state employee. The chief operating officer will coordinate Strike Force duties consistent with the provisions of this executive order, and act solely in an advisory capacity as it relates to Strike Force duties.

Chief Medical Advisors Working Group. The Strike Force shall include a working group consisting of chief medical advisors to advise the chief operating officer and other parts of the Strike Force concerning the health and medical evidence relevant to the Strike Force's duties. The chief medical advisors will be invited to serve by the governor. The working group and its members will assist in fulfilling the Strike Force duties, and act solely in an advisory capacity.

Working Groups. The chief operating officer may create such additional working groups, consisting of state, local, and other officials providing their advice and assistance, as the chief operating officer deems appropriate. The additional working groups should address at least the following topics: Workforce, Economic Development, and International Trade; Education; Fiscal Accountability; Energy; Arts, Culture, and Entertainment; Health Care Systems; Infrastructure; and Emergency Management and Supply Chain. These working group members will be invited to serve by the chief operating officer, and each working group will be led by one or more leaders. These working groups and their members will assist in fulfilling the Strike Force duties, and act solely in an advisory capacity.

State Officials. The Lieutenant Governor, the Speaker of the House of

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Representatives, the Attorney General, and the Comptroller have agreed to serve as consulting members of the Strike Force. The governor will consult with the elected state officials as necessary and appropriate concerning advice and recommendations. The elected state officials will act solely in an advisory capacity as it relates to all Strike Force duties.

Meetings. The Strike Force may meet, by telephone or videoconference, at the call of the governor or the chief operating officer. No quorum requirements or meeting formalities shall be required for this advisory body or any of its subparts.

Vacancies and Additions. The governor may invite people to fill any vacancies that occur, may invite additional members, and may create and fill additional Strike Force positions as needed.

Administrative Support. The Office of the Governor shall provide administrative support for the Strike Force. All state agencies are hereby directed to cooperate with and assist the Strike Force in the performance of its duties.

Other Provisions. Any state or local government employees serving on the Strike Force do so in addition to the regular duties of their respective positions. Members of the Strike Force, other than the chief operating officer and any other employees within the Office of the Governor assigned to support the chief operating officer or the Strike Force, shall serve without salary or compensatory per diem. All Strike Force members who are providing their advice and assistance on a volunteer basis are doing so at the request and invitation of the governor and the Office of the Governor. All Strike Force members shall act solely in an advisory capacity. The criminal penalty provisions set forth in any emergency management plan under Section 418.173 of the Texas Government Code do not apply to this executive order.

This executive order shall remain in effect and in full force until modified, amended, rescinded, or superseded by the governor.
